Ryan Cuskelly achieved a career high World ranking of 12 in February and has now opened up a commanding lead over Cameron Pilley (W#18) as Australia's best.



The lefthander from Lismore in NSW played only two events in February and one of those saw him pitted against Pilley.

The Cambridge Cup in Toronto is not a PSA event but it still attracts many of the World's best players. The 8 pros who participated in this year's CC included W#2 Karim Abdel Gawad (EGY) and W#3 Gregory Gaultier (FRA). Six Top 25 World ranked players mad up the rest of the field.

What is great about the CC is that additional matches are played and even

though it was only a playoff for 7th, which pitted the two Aussies against each other, it was a match up that is rarely seen on the circuit.

Cuskelly lost his opening match to the eventual winner W#8 Tarek Momen (EGY) 9-11, 9-11. That then saw him take on former World Junior Champion Diego Elias (PER) which he lost in four in 62 minutes.

That loss brought Cusko to the Playoff for 7/8 against Cam. Pilley won the opening game 11-5 but Cuskelly won the next two 11-8, 12-10 to take the match 2-1.

Cuskelly's next assignment was the Windy City Open (PSA150 World Series event) against Diego Elias and unfortunately, Cusko lost again to the rising star from Peru. This time it was in straight 8-11, 6-11 in 66 minutes.

Cameron Pilley began February with the Swedish Open. Seeded #6 Pilley won his opening match against qualifier Joel Makin (WAL) 11-6, 11-9,11-9 in 54 minutes to set up a quarter final match up with #1 seed and W#2 Karim Abdel Gawad (EGY).

In January at the Tournament of Champions these two had an epic 5 game match which lasted 82 minutes with Gawad winning 8-11, 11-4, 11-6, 8-11, 11-9. This time it took even longer - 99 minutes for a similar result! Gawad won 11-7, 9-11, 11-9, 12-14, 11-6.

Pilley's next event was the Cambridge Cup in Toronto where he played Gawad again. Unfortunately for Pilley it was another agonising loss in four but the scores

were still very close. Gawad won in 45 minutes 11-9, 11-9, 10-12, 12-10.

That put Pilley up against W#25 Cesar Salazar (MEX) and despite winning the first two games Pilley couldn't shake the Mexican off losing a tight match 11-6, 12-10, 9-11, 9-11, 8-11 in 54 minutes.

That brought him into an all Aussie clash with Ryan Cuskelly in the Playoff for 7th. Pilley began well winning the opening game but didn't have the polish at the right end of the next two losing the 3 game match up 11-5, 8-11, 10-12.

It was then off to the Windy City Open in Chicago where he had to play Stephen Coppinger (RSA). The match

promised to be a close affair between the W#17 and W#19 and that is exactly what eventuated.



Pilley began brilliantly winning the first two games but couldn't put the South African away losing a marathon 119 minute match 11-9, 11-8, 8-11, 5-11, 7-11.

Pilley summed up his situation best "Unfortunately an early exit for me in the Windy City Open here in Chicago. Up 1-0 and 8-4, only to then get smashed in the nose with a follow through. Nose broke, I reset it, won the 2nd game, but lost out 3-2. So frustrating. Should be all good for Canary Wharf in 10 days!"

Rex Hedrick meanwhile has been competing in Pittsburgh and Atlanta.

Seeded #6 for the PSA25 Pittsburgh Open, Hedrick began well beating Pakistani Tayyab Aslam 11-4, 6-11, 11-6, 11-6 but found Kiwi #4 seed Campbell Grayson (NZL) too strong in the quarter finals losing 2-11, 9-11, 7-11 in 43 minutes.

It was then off to Atlanta to see what he could do as the #1 seed in the PSA10 Atlanta Open.

It was Hedrick verses England for his first 3 matches! He beat qualifier Charlie Johnson 11-3, 11-7, 11-5 and #6 seed Eddie Charlton 11-8, 11-5, 11-7 before completing the English treble against #3 seed Angus Gillams in the semi final 12-10, 13-15, 12-10, 11-3 (90m).

That semi may have taken the edge off Hedrick but he still gave it his absolute best in the final losing in four to #5 seed Canadian Shawn Delierre 7-11, 11-4, 10-12, 6-11 in 65 minutes.

Delierre didn't get an easy passage through to the final either. He needed 85 minutes to beat #2 seed Henrik Mustonen (FIN) 9-11, 11-6, 11-6, 9-11, 11-9.

Hedrick improved his World Ranking during the month returning to his career high of 51 which he achieved in December 2016.

Lets hope Rex breaks into the World Top 50 shortly!

Sarah Cardwell reached the semi final of the PSA10 Winnipeg Winter Club Open before bowing out to unseeded Zeina Mickawy from Egypt. #1 seed Cardwell lost 2-11, 6-11, 2-11 to the up and coming W#68. Cardwell then went to Cleveland Ohio in the hope of qualifying for the PSA50 Cleveland Open. Unfortunately, she ran into W#30 Fiona Moverley (ENG) who beat her in the qualifying finals 12-10, 11-8, 11-4.

It was then off to Chicago to hopefully qualify for the PSA150 Windy City Open but sadly Cardwell couldn't get past the first round of qualifying. W#52 Samantha Cornett from Canada beat her 9-11, 11-2, 11-8, 11-7 (39m). That was still a respectable effort because Cornett went on to reach the quarter finals by beating #9 seed and W#11 Joelle King (NZL) in the 1st round.

Tamika Saxby followed a similar path to Sarah Cardwell by competing in the same three events. Saxby would have been a touch disappointed with her results but the experience playing in such major events is just invaluable. Seeded #3 for the Winnipeg Open Saxby was eliminated in the first round by the eventual finalist Zeina Mickawy from Egypt 6-11, 3-11, 8-11. This was same person that beat Cardwell in the semi.

W#28 Nadine Shahin (EGY) then knocked Saxby out of the qualifying finals of the Cleveland Open 11-8, 11-8 and W#45 Misaki Kobayashi (JPN) was too strong for Saxby winning a tense 5 game battle 6-11, 9-11, 12-10, 11-7, 11-2 (39m) in the first round of qualifying for the Windy City Open.







BRISBANE CITY SQUASH SANDGATE SQUASH MS OPEN 2017

The first Australian PSA event for 2017 gets underway at Sandgate Squash Centre from 3-5 March 2017.

Hong Kong's Ho Tze-Lok (WR50) and Rebecca Chu (WR60) are the top two seeds and look set to reach the final. However, three Aussies will be doing their very best to stop the overseas raiders.

Lisa Camilleri, Jessica Turnbull and Samantha Davies are all ranked in the Top 100 and on their day are more than capable of causing an upset or two.

Our best chance of success looks to be Lisa Camilleri who reached 6 PSA finals in 2016.

Camilleri looks set to reach the semi final and will need to play her best to beat Vanessa Chu. In their last encounter (September 2016) Chu was too strong for Camilleri winning their quarter final 11-7, 11-4, 9-11, 11-4 in the China Challenge Cup.

Camilleri will most likely play Kiwi **Emma Millar** in the quarter finals. The last time these two played each other (July 2016) it was a tough win for Camilleri in five at the South Australian Open 11-5, 15-17, 11-8, 8-11, 11-2 in 44 minutes.

Jessica Turnbull and Samantha Davies are on the same side of the draw and should play each other in the quarter finals. The winner will most likely take on Ho Tze-Lok in the semi final.



Six players received Bronze Medals: Stewart Boswell, David Palmer and Rachael Grinham won individual bronze.

Our doubles team's: David Palmer & Paul Price, Natalie & Rachael Grinham and Joseph Kneipp & Robyn Cooper also won bronze medals.

Australia won more medals in Manchester but Sarah Fitz-Gerald was the only Aussie who could win GOLD.

For the last 21 years I have visited approximately 200 Squash Centres or Clubs per year throughout Australia and without doubt the comment I hear the most is "what are we doing to get more juniors?" So this is not a new challenge!

It is for this reason that one of the four major goals (pillars) of Squash United focuses on juniors and I believe our solution will provide a definite outcome that everyone can support. So what is our goal?

Our goal is that in 10 years time Australia will win the World Junior Championships. In all likelihood this will be achieved by players not yet playing and coached by coaches not yet coaching. In fact to achieve this goal our entire sport at junior level will need to change or perhaps to put it better, it will need to evolve significantly!

So how will this happen ... how will we win the World Championships for Juniors in 10 years? Like all marathons it will be achieved one step at a time but the first step is a very important one and it is the only step I will be significantly focused on for now.

Step 1: We are going to collate a list of 500 players aged between 7 and 9 that are currently playing whether it be on a casual basis or in some form of organised competition.

It is from this group that our World Championship Team will most likely be formed. Each of these players will receive recognition from Squash United as being a member of the **2027 World Champions Squad.**

Our only goal with this initial squad will be to keep them playing squash! We all know that if we keep them playing then we stand a better chance of squash becoming a habit and once it is a habit then we can get down to teaching them!

So almost every time I share my concepts with some people I see them get "the look" which is followed by "the comment" along the lines of "where will the money come from for this?" which is sort of code for them saying "it cant be done".

Nonsense!

It can be done, it will be done and the technology now exists to make this a lot easier. But let me just give you a couple of quick insights into how we will initially raise some funds.

1/ I will ask my Squash Friends to donate specific amounts of money to benefit specific players and they will be acknowledged for this. Please note that I used the word donate, its not sponsorship really is it! Each Junior Player requires only a \$10 donation for Step One.

2/ We are about to release the Squash United Socks and these will be available to every Squash Centre, Squash Club and Squash Player in Australia. Every sale will generate funds for Step One. I will leave it up to the individual entities to disclose how much they are contributing from each sale.

3/ Corporate Donations: I'm fortunate to know many people in Corporations that want to make contributions so this pathway will be perfect for them.

Ok so here is where I'm currently at. I have only released this information to a select few people and organisations and I already have commitments to fund 50% of Step One ... without even focusing on it!

So the real challenge is going to be finding the 500 Juniors between the ages of 7-9.

For this to work I am going to need assistance from a lot of people Australia wide and I'm confident that we can make it happen.

But I really want to smash this goal so I am already organising for many squash centres to have FREE regular (weekly/fortnightly/monthly) Come and Try sessions for 7-9 year olds.

This will be taking place in some of Australia's best Squash Centres and will start soon.

This goal does not commence until the 1st of July but clearly I need to get the message out now to start the process.

I will shortly be finalising the Squash Council which is a team picked by me to keep me accountable. All the members have known and worked with me for at least 10 years so they will keep me in line.
