# Anticipation grows for 2017 Victorian Open

An array of international and local squash stars will converge on the Mulgrave Country Club next month for the 2017 Victorian Open Squash Championships. The Victorian Open is the premier squash event in Victoria, and stands as the second largest event on the Australian Squash Tour. This year's tournament will run over six days from July 11–16.

Since its inception as an amateur event in 1931, some of the most prominent figures in Victorian and Australian squash have won the title, with champions such as Geoff Hunt (10 Times), Heather McKay (14 times), Chris Dittmar, Rodney Martin, Vicki Cardwell, Michelle Martin, Sarah Fitz-Gerald and David Palmer all among those to have held the trophy. In 2017, a host of local and international professional stars are set to take part in both the Men's and Women's Opens, with players competing for the respective \$10,000 prize pools on offer.

In the Women's Open, Sarah Cardwell (World No. 44) will be the leading local Victorian hope, while New Zealander Amanda Landers-Murphy (World No. 51) and Tamika Saxby (Australia, World No. 52) are expected to be in the reckoning come the pointy end of the tournament.

For the Men's Open, Victoria's own Rex Hedrick (World No. 57) will enter the tournament as the number one seeded player, however he will face stiff competition from the likes of Dutchman Piedro Schweertman (World No. 70) if he wants to claim his maiden Victorian Open title.

Along with the Open categories, the tournament will also host a strong contingent of local players from around the state in the graded competition events. For those who can't make it to Mulgrave Country Club to view the action, the 2017 Victorian Open will once again will be streamed live and for free thanks to **My Sport Live**.

She has enjoyed success in Australia winning the North Coast Open in 2011 and the City of Perth Open 2012. At the Victorian Open she was a quarter finalist in 2012 and a semi finalist in 2011. In 2017 she has reached the last 16 at the Cleveland Open.




**6. Vanessa Chu** - The Hong Kong born player has won 3 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 50. She won all 3 of her tour titles in 2015 with one being in Australia at the McKay Open. In 2017 she has been runner up at the Brisbane Sandgate Squash MS Open and the Perrier Challenge Cup.




2. Sarah Cardwell - The Melbourne born player has won 3 tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 41. In 2014 she represented Australia at the Commonwealth Games. At the Victorian Open she has reached the guarter finals in 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2014. In 2017 she has reached the semi finals at the Winnipeg Open and was runner up at the Delaware Open.



7. Lisa Camilleri - The Australian has won 21 tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 28. Her most successful year on tour was in 2010 when she won 9 tour titles. She represented Australia at the Commonwealth Games in 2010 and 2014. In 2017 she has reached the semi finals at the Brisbane Sandgate Squash MS Open.









5. Tamika Saxby - The Australian has won 6 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 49. She represented Australia at the Women's World Team Championships in 2016. At the Victorian Open she reached the quarter finals in 2013. In 2016 she won 4 tour titles in a row and in 2017 she has won the City of Kalgoorlie Open.







**8. Jessica Turnbull** - The Brisbane based player has a career world ranking of 73. At the Victorian Open she has reached the last 16 in 2011, 2014 and 2015. In 2017 she has been a quarter finalist at the Brisbane Sandgate Squash MS Open and the NZ International Classic and a semi finalist at the North Shore Open.



**DARK HORSE**: Christine Nunn - The Melbourne based player has a career high world ranking of 36 and is the winner of 3 PSA tour titles.

- **1. Rex Hedrick** The Melbourne born player is the winner of 9 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 51. At the Victorian Open he was a quarter-finalist in 2014, a semi-finalist in 2011 and runner-up in 2016. In 2017 he has reached the semi finals of the Invercargill Open and was runner-up at the Atlanta Open.
- 2. Piedro Schweeterman The Dutch No1 is the winner of 11 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 63. This is first appearance at the Victorian Open and has enjoyed success in Australia winning the NSW Open in 2014. In 2017 he was runner up at the Bankers Hall Club Pro Am and the Madison Open.
- **3. Leandro Romiglio** The Argentinian No1 is the winner of 5 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 73. He won the Bronze Medal at the 2015 Pan American Games. This is his first appearance at the Victorian Open. In 2017 he has reached 3 PSA tournament semi-finals and has won the Guilfoyle Financial Squash Classic and the Paraguay Open.
- **4.** Harinder Pal Singh Sandhu The Indian No3 is the winner of 7 PSA tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 56. He was part of the Indian team that won the Gold Medal at the 2014 Asian Games. He was a semi-finalist in 2016 at the Victorian Open. In 2017 he has won the Malaysian Squash Tour IX and the 2nd Nissan Open.
- **5. Joshua Larkin** The Australian has won 4 tour titles and has a career high world ranking of 81. Two of his tour titles were in 2015 winning City of Perth Open and Kalgoorlie Open. At the Victorian Open he has reached the last 16 in 2013, 2014 and 2015. In 2017 he has been the runner-up at the Pure Blonde Elanora Open and the NT Open.

## PAKISTAN'S TOORPAKAI APPOINTED TO IOC WOMEN IN SPORT COMMISSION



Pakistan squash star **Maria Toorpakai Wazir** has been appointed to the International Olympic Committee's **Women** in **Sport Commission** in a role that will see her assist the IOC in the development and implementation of their women and sport policy.

Toorpakai, who hails from the highly conservative South Waziristan, is one of the most inspirational squash players of all time, whose remarkable journey to become a professional athlete saw her disguise herself as a boy in order to train, compete and attend school in a Taliban-controlled area of Pakistan – where girls rarely leave their homes and the idea of women competing in sport is regarded as un-Islamic.

Despite receiving death threats from the Taliban against her and her family, Toorpakai overcame almost universal hostility to forge a career as a professional squash player. The 26-year -old is now the highest-ranked female squash player in Pakistan.

Toorpakai is a strong advocate for equality and joins the Women in Sport Commission as part of a 70 per cent increase in female participation across the IOC Commissions since September 2013, with 38 per cent of the IOC Commissions taken up by women.

As part of her role in the Women in Sport Commission, Toorpakai will advise the IOC Session, the IOC Executive Board and the IOC President on promoting the rights and well-being of women and girls in sport, promoting the use of sport as a tool for gender equality and empowerment and raising awareness of harassment and abuse in sport.

"It's definitely very exciting news for me and for all of us," said Toorpakai (pictured below right with coach Jonathon Power, the former world No.1 from Canada). "I can play a better role from this position for athletes and girls in sports.

"The Olympics is a stage where the whole world unites and shows their human power. It's our duty to provide all the athletes, male and female, with equal opportunities and a safer and respectable environment."

"All countries should use humans' potential to its full and it's important for world peace and our economic stability. Inequality, injustice and exclusion leads to the waste of immense talent and ideas, reduces human performance and leads to complete chaos and destruction."

"I really appreciate IOC President Thomas Bach's efforts to introduce more women to the IOC Commissions. It was a much needed step and it will definitely improve female athletes' participation in the Olympics. I am very hopeful that these changes will have a positive impact on this coming Olympic Games."

Ashley Bernhard, Deputy Chairman of the Professional Squash Association (PSA), said: "As a vocal advocate for women's rights and equality in sport, Maria is an exceptional role-model and we look forward to her using her experiences and providing her ideas to further the goal of equal participation for women in sport.

"Maria's incredible story, which saw her triumph in the face of adversity, can inspire and empower women in all four corners of the globe and we are delighted that she will be able to contribute to the Women in Sport Commission."

World Squash Federation President Jacques Fontaine added: "Every player has a journey, but very occasionally there is one that is very special and transcends her sport. Maria's is one of those. She is a most admirable young woman whose experiences will inspire everybody.

"Her enthusiasm to fight for others following her own battles is one that the IOC's Women in Sport Commission will be able to use to advocate ever more strongly for women."







#### Squash Favourite for 2024 Olympic Games inclusion

Bidding for the 2024 Summer Olympics games started in 2015, with five candidate cities in contention, but Hamburg, Rome and Budapest subsequently withdrew. The two remaining candidate sites are Los Angeles and Paris.

The World Squash Federation (WSF) has made clear its desperation to join the Olympic programme. So have leading squash players: James Willstrop and Nicol David; the eight-time women's world champion, has repeatedly said that she would swap all her world titles for an Olympic gold medal.

By the criteria that the IOC uses to measure prospective sports, squash has a strong case. The sport has genuine global appeal: last year 47 countries hosted tour events, featuring players from 74 nations. There are 1.6 million American players, and more than 20 million worldwide, according to US Squash.

New rules allow the hosts to propose additional sports which bodes well for squash since both countries have good squash programs.

#### THE CASE LOS ANGELES

Squash in the USA has largely been driven by high-end country clubs, this has fuelled its development in the Collegiate sector with Harvard, MIT, Cornel etc having very strong squash programs. US Squash has played an excellent role in bringing together all of these influential stakeholders to position the sport in a great place for Los Angeles inclusion.

#### THE CASE PARIS

New WSF President Jacques Fontain is French and sits on the French National Olympic Committee. France has a number of strong medal contenders such as Gregory Gaultier (current world number 1), Camille Serme (current World number 3), Thierry Lincou (former world number 1, now retired), Mathieu Castagnet (former world number 5, current 26), Gregoire Marche (current world 25), Lucas Serme (current world 41). Squash is developing well in France and has a good media presence, as well as social standing as the sport is played by many in the middle class.

The WSF believes that squash would enjoy significant benefits if it were added to the Olympics —Olympic inclusion would still produce something of a boom. It would entitle the sport to funding from the IOC; Mr Shelley says that even a few million dollars over a four-year cycle would make a "substantial difference" to the WSF's development work.

Yet the most significant benefits would not be financial, but in "visibility", he says. Seeing the event in the games would help to grow squash's fan base. And the prospect of winning an Olympic medal would also give young players another incentive to pursue a career in the sport.

Logistically, squash would also be an easy fit for the games. The event that the WSF has proposed—singles tournaments for men and women, featuring 32 players apiece—could be run exclusively on two all-glass courts, either inside or outside. And squash has already shown its suitability in other multi-sport events: more than one million people watched the men's singles final in the last Commonwealth Games.

"We would bring something special to the Olympics," says Andrew Shelley, the chief executive of the WSF.

Aussie Josh Larkin and Scotland's Douglas Kempsell played a gruelling 149 minute encounter in the semi-final of the 2015 Greater Shepparton City Council International, PSA M5 – becoming the **fifth longest professional squash match ever recorded.** 

Larkin, the only remaining Australian left in the tournament, started well and took the opening game before Kempsell turned the match on its head with fantastic performances in the second and third games. Aiming to reach his third PSA World Tour final, Larkin battled back to level things up but, after an energy sapping fifth and final game that went all the way to a tie-break, Kempsell emerged victorious to bring an end to the mammoth match with a 6-11, 11-6, 11-6, 9-11, 13-11 scoreline.







#### **Interactive Squash**

Fun With Balls GmbH, the company behind Interactive Squash, a German-based initiative hoping to transform the sport of squash by embracing a revolutionary piece of projection technology and turn squash courts into interactive playgrounds, have claimed top honours at the ISPO BRANDNEW 2017 awards.

Interactive Squash won the best new product award in the fitness category section at the awards, which recognises newcomers to the sports industry for their ingenuity and innovation. Using a modified tin, motion sensors and an overhead projector, housed in the ceiling and projecting imagery onto the front wall, Interactive Squash turns the front wall into an artist's canvas, allowing players to choose from a variety of games in order to hone their skills, improve conditioning or compete in an interactive leaderboard, turning target practice into a rewarding immersive experience where the addictive gameplay elements means that the focus is on the fun and not the burn.

#### From a school yard to Dubai Opera, squash has come a long way

Squash has a fascinating history, and the game's leading historian, James Zug, has published a major new work on the origins of the sport on the World Squash Federation website. From a school yard to the opulence of Dubai Opera House, squash has come a long way. The two new additions to the WSF website begin with a 6,000 word essay on the history of the game at <a href="https://www.worldsquash.org/ws/a-sport-with-history">www.worldsquash.org/ws/a-sport-with-history</a>

Zug connects the parents of squash – real tennis, racquets and fives – with the origins of squash at Harrow School in England in the 1850s. He goes on to show how the game spread around the world; the emergence of a professional tour; the development of doubles; and the game's position today as a global sport.

History of Squash Timeline at <a href="www.worldsquash.org/ws/WSF-timeline">www.worldsquash.org/ws/WSF-timeline</a> begins at Harrow in the 1850s and identifies the first court built in USA in 1884, making it the second of the current 185 countries where squash is now played. The first book on squash is listed (1901), as is the formation of various national federations, including South Africa in 1910, Canada in 1913 and Egypt in 1931. In 1965 the first window in a solid court wall appeared; the viewing revolution in the 1980s is detailed (a decade in which legendary Pakistani Jahangir Khan's five-and-a-half -year unbeaten run ended, in 1986); and, later, scoring and tin height changes are also covered.

"There was a time when squash rackets were made of wood, there was no such thing as a glass backwall, never mind an all-glass showcourt – and even further back there were no standard rules of the game nor defined court dimensions," said Andrew Shelley, CEO of the World Squash Federation. "Squash has a long history that began in the 1850s and to be able to scroll through the many dates helps us remember game's key milestones. James Zug has ensured that while we look to the future the past is not lost."
