
**Oscar Curtis** was simply awesome winning the National U13 title in straight. Oscar dropped just 25 points throughout the individual competition.

#### **Story by Tim Cowell**

The Australian Junior Championships has a long, prestigious history. One of the longest consecutive running events on the Australian Squash Calendar, the AJC bring the best juniors from across the country together for 9 days of intense squash. As events go, the only event harder than the AJC, is the World Individual/Teams Championships. From a players perspective, the individuals can see anywhere from 3-5 matches across 4 days, followed up by 3 and a half days of 2 matches per day. Often the final day of the event turns into a survival of the fittest contest which makes things really interesting!

From a coaches point of view, the AJC is 12 months in the making. As soon as the 2016 AJC had finished, planning was underway for this years squad: off season training camps took place, certain tournaments were targeted, players and their individual coaches reflected and began improvement initiatives.

Once you get to the event, emotions run high and the thoughts of, have we done everything right in preparation, are we smart enough, are we fit enough, are we good enough to do it this year, are on repeat daily! More than 15 years ago now, when I was a junior in the team for the first time, WA was really just making up the numbers ... the big states didn't consider us much of a threat. But hard work at the grass roots and club level right across the state since then has seen WA become one of the powerhouse states, consistently in the top 3 for a number of years now and overall runner ups in the previous 2 events.

However, before the teams event starts, the AJC individual championships take place, offering the most prestigious individual title in Australian Junior Squash - the Australian National Champion. After a fairly lengthy drought of individual titles for many years, recent years have been considerably more fruitful. This year WA went one better again, picking up 3 national champions in Oscar Curtis (Bu13), Greg Chan (BU15) and Erin Classen (GU15). Greg and Erin both won last year's U13 titles so to win this year's U15 titles as first year players is a fantastic effort. Greg had some work to do to get over Luke Eyles whilst Erin had to fight back to get the win over Katie Davies in 5. Meanwhile, Oscar finally got to add an U13 national title to his growing collection not dropping a single game all event!

Abel Jin had a fantastic tournament, coming from outside the top 4 to make the final of the BU17. Jacob Ford had a fantastic individuals event and Abel really pushed him in that final, but couldn't quite get over the line going down in 4. Huge effort though from Abel to really take it up to him.

Rounding out our individual medal winners were Isla Harris (GU11) from the small

town of Moora. Isla continues Moora's presence in the state team with Kiara Rogers and Ethan Baldwin-Wright also starting out playing squash in Moora. Isla lost a really tight semi final in 5, but played a great match to finish 3rd in the GU11. Pascale Louka came up against eventual winner Alex Haydon in the semi finals, playing a great match but was simply outclassed. Pascale then played a strong final match to finish 3rd in the GU17.

A new addition on trial at this year's event was the doubles. Oscar Curtis and Dylan Classen teamed up and managed to take out the U15 doubles category in a very close 2-1 final!

A bit of R & R at Bells Beach on the day off had the team primed for the teams event, with a favourable draw to work with. A quick summary of each tie follows:

#### Day 1 WA v NSW

13s got us off to a great start, with both Oscar Curtis and Kaleb Sands winning in 3. Isla Harris came really close to getting a win, losing the first game 12/14 and the 4th 10/12! Likewise Caitlin Pratt who went down 12/14 in the 5th! But it was 3 valuable points in the overall giving WA the 13s tie. The 15s continued the trend with Greg Chan and Eric Gray kicking things off both winning 3-0. Isabella French had a tough one against Maggie Goodman, going down in 3 but Erin Classen secured the tie with a 3-0 win over Georgia Lane. The 17 girls were dominant with Anita Tsangaris and Pascale Louka both winning in 3. Remi Young started off strong against Haani Qureshi winning 3-0 before Abel Jin lost to Jacob Ford in 3. 3 ties to 0 meant that by this stage we had wrapped up the overall against NSW. The 19s had a real battle on their hands, Jade Woods lost to Elle Lane 10/12 in the 5th! Kiara Rogers fought hard against Shehana Vithana but lost 0-3. Tough gig for the boys as well with Trey Mackenzie going down 0-3 to Patrick Hart and Callum Blakey lost 0-3 to Ryan Marshall. Result was WA won 3 ties overall to 1.

#### WA vs TAS

No matches for the 13 girls so it was just up to the boys. Kaleb Sands won in 4 over Oliver Pridmore whilst Oscar Curtis got the job done 3-0 over Kieran Simpson. Again only the boys in the 15s had matches, with Dylan Classen winning 3-0 over Joseph Clyde and Greg Chan winning 3-0 over Ben Hudson. Only 1 match for the 17 girls with Pascale Louka taking on Emma Clyde. Pascale has had some difficulty with her in the past but played a great match to win 3-0. Remi Young was up against Harry Palfreyman and played a really solid match to win 3-0 and secure the 17s. Abel Jin was starting to struggle against Toby Moore, going down 0-3. Making her teams event debut, Isabella Diver was up against Bethany Campbell. Isabella played a great match to win 3-0 and with Trey Mackenzie also winning 3-0 it was down to points for Callum Blakey and Jade Woods. Although Jade and Callum both

lost in 3, Jade almost covered Bella's points but Callum came home really strong in the boys to pick up enough points to win the 19s! WA won 4 ties to 0.

#### Day 2 WA vs ACT

Strong start by the 13's with everyone winning 3-0. Eva French made her teams event debut with a win over Matilda Morgan, Caitlin Prait beat Kaitlyn O'Neill 3-0, Mitch Ferrari made his debut with a 3-0 win and Oscar Curtis won 33-0! No match again for the 15 girls, Dylan Classen got up 3-0 over Sam Jenkin and Eric Gray won 3-0 over Charlie Carey. The 17 boys had some work to do. Oscar Lindsey began his teams event debut winning the first against Declan Smith but eventually lost in 4. Remi Young started well again against Sam Sergo winning the first two before Sam fought back to take the match in 5. Just Pascale Louka to play in the girls, with her win in 3 and no 2nd player, WA held out to win the 17's by 3 games. Again only 1 match in the girls 19s, with Jade Woods winning 3-0 and starting to find some better form. Trey Mackenzie was dominant in his 3-0 win over Liam Rogers whilst Callum Blakey had a fight on his hands and couldn't quite get over the line losing 2-3 to Riley Ellis. The win in the 19s rounded out a 4-0 win to WA.

#### WA vs SA

Isla Harris had her first teams event win, with a 3-0 victory over Charlotte Evans. Caitlin Pratt won 3-0 over Aimee Treloar and with only 1 match in the boys - Oscar Curtis winning 3-0 it was a 4-0 win to the 13s. Again, no matches for the 15 girls. Dylan Classen and Greg Chan both had comfortable wins in 3 to secure the 2nd age group tie. There was a bit of work to do in the 17s. Anita Tsangaris was outclassed by Nimsari Weerasinghe losing 0-3 whilst Pascale Louka got the job done over Kate Winters 3-0. Oscar Lindsey was down 0-2 before a spirited fight back got him back to 2-2. Another big come back from him in the 5th but couldn't get over the line losing 9-11 against Ciaran Shouksmith. With 2 games to play Remi Young dropped the first game but managed to steady from there and win in 4, securing the 17s and a 3-0 overall lead. Isabella Diver came in for her 2nd match winning in 3. Kiara Rogers was up against Alex Haydon who was playing up in the U19s. She fought hard but Alex was too strong winning 3-0. Ethan Baldwin-Wright was in for his first match this teams event and started well taking the first game, but dropped off a bit as Jaedan Lee over ran him to take the match in 4. Trey Mackenzie had a tough one against Sam Haydon, with the first game going 13-11 in Sam's favour. In the end Sam was too strong winning 3-0. WA Dropped the 19s, but won the overall 3-1 against SA.

#### Day 3 WA vs VIC

With our bye in the morning, we had a fresher crack at Victoria. This was a tough one on paper and a simple case of our players expected to win needing to whilst our players not expected to win had to try and pick up some bonus points along the way. Eva French got us off to a great start, picking up an important game and almost took

the 2nd before going down in 4 to Jananii Sukunesan. Caitlin Pratt had a tough encounter with Courtney Scholz losing in 3 however, with Mitchell Ferrari beating Mason Boardman 3-0 and Oscar Curtis beating Andre Lynn 3-0 the 13s got over the line by 1 game! Oscar Lindsey fought hard for his points, picking up 12 from Dylan Molinaro. Remi Young managed to overcome Alex Baines, with the first game going 12-10, Remi got on top to take it in 3. It was down to Pascale Louka with Ashira Chait going for everything, Pascale had to play a bit more reserved than her normal attacking play style. She managed to hold off Ashira to win 3-0, securing the win for WA. With the overall wrapped up, our 19s could relax a bit more when taking to the court. Jade Woods got us off to a great start with a 3-0 win over Maria-Rose Kalafatis. Kiara Rogers pushed Jessica Graham the whole way, taking the 3rd game with a solid display of squash before Jess got on top of her in the 4th. Trey Mackenzie was right in it against Ben Ratcliffe as well, a slow start but he bounced right back to take the 2nd, before losing the 3rd 11-13 and the 4th 7-11. Tate Norris was back from injury and was too strong for Callum Blakey winning in 3. Overall a 3-1 win against Victoria and undefeated heading into the tie vs QLD.

#### Day 4 WA vs QLD

After successfully negotiating the other 5 states, our grand final had come. WA vs Queensland, WA trying to win the overall for the first time, Queensland looking for their 14th straight overall win. As mentioned before, often this day is down to survival of the fittest!

Isla Harris got the excitement levels up early, taking the first game against Shona Coxsedge. She had her chances to go 2-1 but couldn't quite get over the line going down 13-15. She bounced back to take the 4th 11-9 with the 5th going down to the wire, Shona taking it 12-10 and the match! Caitlin Pratt faced the hard hitting Madison Lyon, she battled on as hard as she could, but Madison was too strong winning 3-0. The boys needed to both win to get us over the line, Kaleb Sands had his work cut out for him and was outclassed in 3, whilst Oscar Curtis finished the tournament off in perfect style, 11-0 in the 3rd and didn't drop 1 game the whole

event. Unfortunately, though it wasn't enough, our 13s losing their first tie for the event and QLD taking a 1-0 lead.

The 15s had a couple of rematches on offer, both U15 finals rematches, as well as the boys 15's 3/4 playoff between BJ MacDonald and Eric Gray. Isabella French was back to face Hayley Hankinson. A tough match and she had her moments. After going 0-2 Bella refocused on her plan, taking the 3rd game 11-8. With things looking good she had a few game balls in the 4th, but Hayley lifted and took the match 12-10 in the 4th. Onto the finals rematches, Erin Classen got off to a good start against Katie Davies, before Katie fought back to take the first 13-11. After a small slip in focus Erin took control and raced to a 2-1 lead before Katie pegged the 4th back. The 5th was that battle for survival we spoke about, with Erin managing to hold out for an 11-8 win. Greg Chan meanwhile discovered his best form and beat Luke Eyles 11-5, 11-1, 11-5 to win the 15s and get us back to 1-1.

Another tough ask for the 17s. With Abel Jin still out of action, Oscar Lindsey had to step up to play Wes Dyer, he fought hard but was outclassed in 3. Anita Tsangaris was up against Ella Burge, after dropping the first, a change of tactics saw her take the 2nd. The 3rd game saw Ella back in total control. A refresher on the game plan coupled with some sheer guts and determination from the Exmouth product saw Anita eventually go down 9-11 in the 4th ... one awesome effort though to finish the event on. Remi Young dug in for one more big effort, taking a 2-0 lead and with things close in the 3rd, a tough call on game ball gave Josh Penfold the game. Remi managed to refocus however, to win in 4. It was down to Pascale Louka and she gave it everything, but on this day Mackenzie Sleep was too good, winning in 3 and giving QLD a 2-1 lead.

Down to the 19s, Jade Woods got us off to a good start, winning 3-0 over Lauren Stieler. Kiara Rogers was then up against Courtney Mather, it was a slow start but Kiara continued to build and gradually gained more control of the match. Couldn't quite get over the line in the end with Courtney too steady winning 3-0. Trey Mackenzie had his work cut out against Lachlan Coxsedge, Trey left everything on the court but Lachlan was simply to strong winning in 3. Callum Blakey was up against national champion, Nick Calvert. Again Nick proved too strong, winning in 3 and securing a 3-1 win for QLD.

Overall a very commendable effort by WA, which would have likely been our largest haul at an AJC event. In the teams event, WA won the 15s and 17s overall age groups (U17s by countback) and finished 2nd in the U13s and the overall state category. Couple this with three individual wins, a doubles win, one individual runner up and two 3rd places ... quite a number of medals ended up in WASP

#### hands!

From a coaches perspective, it was one of those bittersweet moments. To finish 2nd overall, to pick up the numerous titles and medals, to overcome the challenges that we were faced with and to see every single one of the players dig in till their last point of the event made us feel exceptionally proud to be Western Australians. The bitter moment obviously being to come so close yet again but not good enough on the day to beat QLD. Well done though to the Sharks, we'll try again next year!

Ed has received the Australian Masters Squash Association's Judith Goadby Memorial Award for Contribution to Masters Squash and in July he was presented with the WAMS Contribution to WA Masters Squash Award.

Ed's contribution to the AMSA Championships reflects his well-known 'can do' attitude. His involvement includes assisting with organisation of the WA teams entering the Interstate Teams Series and representing WA Masters committee at Teams meetings and the AMSA AGM when called upon. Ed regularly participates in the AMSA Championships and Interstate Teams event receiving his 15 year participation medallion this year.


