2017 Highlights



The **Australian Squash Player Annual** has been created and compiled by Kim Schramm for **Squash Media**.

2017 was a very positive year. It began a little sadly when we had to say “Good Bye” to **Natalie Grinham** at the Tournament of Champions. Grinham has officially retired from the PSA World Tour. Thank you so much Natalie for so many wonderful memories

On court the year began brilliantly with **Ryan Cuskelly** winning the PSA M70 Motor City Open in Detroit. It was the Aussie #1's biggest win on tour and his 15th career title.

On 28th February 2017 **Mike Corren** turned 43. So he went off and celebrated by doing what he does best. Yes, he went down to Esperance and won another title. And yes, it was yet another title defence. The Esperance Open was a PSA Closed Satellite.

Zac Alexander kicked off his 2017 campaign in style dropping just 14 points against arch rival Josh Larkin. Larkin was left shaking his head after winning their last encounter at the Brisbane Open in late 2016.

Squash Australia reintroduced the Australian Closed and played the Championships in Townsville. It was fitting that the two stars of the 2016 Domestic Tour dominated the PSA National Closed Satellite event. **Zac Alexander** and **Tamika Saxby** “ruled the roost” winning their respective events in straight.

There were shock exits a plenty at the NT Open in May. Zac Alexander, Matt Hopkin and Rhys Dowling were all eliminated in the quarter finals. **Josh Larkin** was the only Aussie survivor and reached the final. Unfortunately, Larkin squandered a 2 games to love lead in the PSA M10 final to ultimately lose in five. Two weeks later he won the PSA M5 North Shore Open in Auckland.

Kalgoorlie celebrated the opening of their brand new squash centre in June. They expanded their hosting of PSA events to include a W5 event. A quality field lined up in the M5 event but that didn't stop **Mike Corren** winning his **52nd Tour Title!** At 43, Corren turned back time once again to win his 6th Golden Open beating an opponent half his age in the final. **Tamika Saxby** was all class winning the inaugural women's final.

Young gun **Rhys Dowling** broke through to win his first PSA Tour Title in July when he took out the PSA M5 Tasmanian Open. Also in July **Christine Nunn** returned to the winner's circle when she won the SA Open at the ARC.

The spotlight in August was on Manchester where the World Doubles Championships were being played. **Ryan Cuskelly** and **Cameron Pilley** avenged their semi final loss in 2016, to defending champions Alan Clyne & Greg Lobban, to become the 2017 **Men's World Doubles Champions**.

2017 Highlights



Back home in August, **Josh Larkin** “bagged a double” winning the PSA M5 Bendigo International and Shepparton International. Both events were 32 player draws.

Tamika Saxby was on fire in September winning back to back North Coast and NSW Opens.

October was a big month in Queensland with the Brisbane Open (PSA Closed Satellite) getting things underway before an upgraded Q Open (PSA M10 and W10) was played on the Gold Coast.

Meanwhile **Zac Alexander** was causing havoc in Canada. The #8 seed was all conquering defeating Canada’s best two players (#2S Nick Sachvie and #5S Shawn Delierre) in the lead up to the PSA M10 final before capturing his 27th Tour Title against #4S Christopher Binnie.

Rhys Dowling was a surprise winner of the Brisbane Open (PSA Closed Satellite) after #1S Josh Larkin didn’t play past the first round. Larkin regrouped and focussed his attention on the Q Open and it nearly paid off. He reached the final but found #1 seed **Rex Hedrick** too strong losing in three.

Tamika Saxby was too strong for her opponents at the Cairns International. The best player on the Domestic Tour won her 9th PSA Tour Title in 2 years.

November saw **Rachael Grinham** “turn back time” to win the PSA W10 Australian Open in Darwin. The 40 year old, #1S, was all smiles after winning her first title since 2014. Also at the Aussie Open, **Tamika Saxby** and **Josh Larkin** were named as the inaugural Australian Squash Tour bonus winners. They pocketed an extra \$3,000 each for supporting and winning sufficient events on the 2017 Domestic Tour.

In December, **Donna Urquhart** rounded off the year in fantastic fashion winning the PSA W25 Monte Carlo Classic. The Aussie #1 picked up her 10th career title and her first since 2015.

Zac Alexander (M10), **Ryan Cuskelly** (M70), **Josh Larkin** (M5) and **Donna Urquhart** (W25) all won PSA Tour Titles overseas during 2017.

Australia's Cuskelly Sees Off Farag to Lift Motor City Open Crown

Australian World No.19 **Ryan Cuskelly** upset defending champion Ali Farag to claim his biggest ever title at the the Suburban Collection Motor City Open, PSA M70 tournament held at the Birmingham Athletic Club in Detroit.

Cuskelly, the 29-year-old based in Greenwich, United States, was appearing at his ninth Motor City Open, but was making his debut final appearance in Detroit after battling past Kiwi qualifier Campbell Grayson, former World No.3 Omar Mosaad and South Africa's Stephen Copping in the earlier rounds.

World No.7 Ali Farag, who defeated three-time World Champion Nick Matthew to win last year's title, eased past Frenchman Gregoire Marche and Colombian Miguel Angel Rodriguez, before recovering from 2-1 down to beat Peru's Diego Elias in the last four.

It was the man from Egypt who started the better of the two as he raced out of the traps with pinpoint precision, dominating the first game to go ahead, before a

resurgent Cuskelly controlled games two and three to take the lead.

Farag looked to be on course to level the scores in the fourth game, going 9-4 up, but a succession of winners from Cuskelly brought the number seven seed back into contention, and a sublime winner at match ball gave him a 4-11, 11-5, 11-5, 11-9 victory and his 15th PSA World Tour title.

"I'm pretty excited to win my biggest title in my favourite tournament on the Tour," said Cuskelly.

"I always told the guys here I'd win it someday, but I didn't expect it to be this year.

"It's unbelievable. I lost in qualification for years, but I did a lot of hard training in December and it paid off."

The vanquished Farag said: "He stepped it up. I couldn't find the right balance between being aggressive and playing smart. Every time I would try to be aggressive, I would hit the tin. "He put too much pressure on me."

Mike Corren beat three young guns to take out his 6th Golden Open. The “Moose” beat 2016 Australian Junior Representative Joseph White 11-7, 11-1, 11-2 (21min) to set up a semi final clash with Tom Calvert.

#4S Corren beat #2S Calvert in 34 minutes 11-5, 11-7, 11-6 to reach yet another PSA Final.

Meanwhile #1S Rhys Dowling took care of Australia’s premier junior from 2016 Alex Eustace beating the #8S 11-5, 11-3, 11-7 (34min) before destroying Solayman Nowrozi (AUS) 11-9, 11-2, 11-2 (28m) to reach the final.

The final was a tense battle between “youth” and “experience”. “Experience” won out in the end 16-14, 8-11, 11-9, 11-6 (60m) giving Corren back to back titles and his 6th Golden Open.

Dowling Breaks Through in Tassie



Rhys Dowling has broken through to win his first PSA Tour Title by taking out the 2017 Tasmanian Open.

The win was full of merit beating #1S Matt Hopkin in five over 50 minutes.

The writing has been on the wall for a short while now that a breakthrough was eminent. Dowling reached the final of the Australian Closed in Townsville in March but was outgunned in straight by Zac Alexander.

He then reached the final of the Golden Open where he played well against the very experienced Mike Corren to go down narrowly 14-16, 11-8, 9-11, 6-11 in 60 minutes.

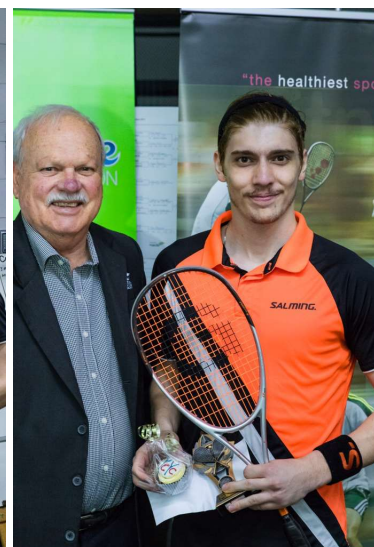
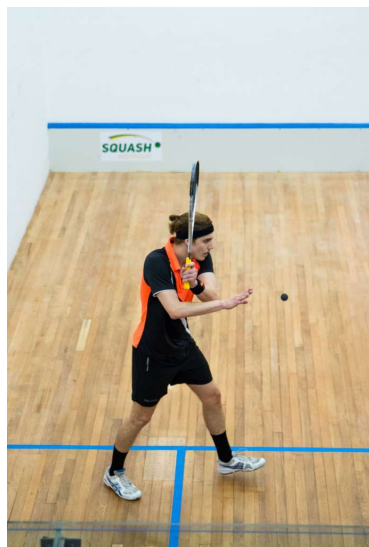

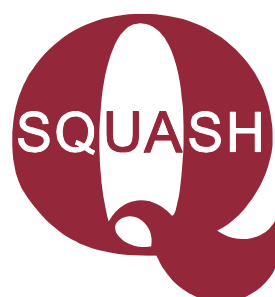


Hedrick Claims 2nd Q Open
