AUSSIE NEWS: JUNE 2016

- Cameron Pilley was named PSA Player of the Month for May recognizing his fantastic effort at the World Series Finals. Pilley went from scrapping through to finishing runner up in this prestigious event. Pilly was the 8th player to qualify for the World Series Finals which features the best 8 players in the World at season end.
- Mike Corren (6) won his 5th City of Kalgoorlie & Boulder Golden Open with a 3-0 victory against Korea's Ko Youngjo (3). In 2014 at the same event, Corren won his 50th PSA title and established a record for being the oldest player to win a PSA tour title at 40 years of age. He has now extended that to 42!
- Rex Hedrick finished runner up to Kiwi Paul Coll in the PSA M15 New Zealand International Classic played at Palmerston North. Hedrick was beaten 5-11, 7-11, 1-11.
- Squash Australia announced that the "Queen of the Court" Nicol David will play two exhibition matches at the 2016 Australian Open. The Malaysian superstar ruled the World of Squash for a record 108 months as the #1 ranked player between August 2006 and June 2015. David won a record 8 World Open titles.
- Tamika Saxby won her second PSA Tour Title in 3 weeks when she defeated Lisa Camilleri (2) to win the Sandgate Open 11-8, 11-5, 4-11, 11-1.
- Josh Larkin (6) went down swinging to Peter Creed (4) from Wales in the quarter finals of the PSA M10 Squashways Christchurch International Open 9-11, 9-11, 11-8, 11-9, 7-11 in a marathon match lasting 84 minutes.
- WSF World Masters Championships entries close 12 August. Notable Australian entries so far include 2014's champions Sarah Fitz-Gerald and Brain Cook. Fitz-Gerald is a two-time World Champion in the women's Over 45 event while Cook lays claim to four world champion titles ranging the Over-45 to Over 65 event. Other Australians making the trip to South Africa include John Alamanos, Raymond Allan, Kevin Beatty, Steven Blencowe, Glenn Bowman, Glenn Bridgeman, Gary Cowan, Basil Crayford, Michael Haybittel, Kevin Healy, Russel Hyde, Garry Irwin, Marilyn Kennedy, Laney Lashbrook-Gough, Brian Lyons, Jane Mackie, Phillip O'Donnell, Darren O'Neill, Aaron Palazzi, Lawrence Parsons, Christopher Photis, Sean Ryan, Chyrel Tait and Maurice Tait.

- Former Women's World No.3 Madeline Perry has extended her contract as the Head Professional at the East Coast Squash Academy in NSW for a further three months.
- Rex Hedrick was knocked out of the PSA M15 NZ Southern Open being played in Invercargill by #1 seed Paul Coll. The 11-4, 9-11, 11-4, 11-4 score line wasn't a fair reflection of just how tough the match was. Coll needed 60 minutes to overcome the relentless Aussie.
- Arguably the best State Junior Championship in Australia got underway in Mackay. The Queensland Junior Championships offer an individual and teams championship over 7 days of competition. The QJC has played a vital role in the success of the Queensland Junior Team (Sharks) winning the last 12 AJC Team Championships (Overall Combined) in succession.

109 junior players converged on the Mackay Leisure Centre to compete in the Queensland Junior Squash Championships from Sunday 26 to Wednesday 29 June.

62 boys and 47 girls battled each other for four days competing for the 5 State Titles on offer: U11; U13; U15; U17 and U19. There was also an unofficial U9 title and an U21 Mixed event.

2016 Australian Open Junior U11 Champion **Benjamin Murray** from the Sandgate Club in Brisbane got Finals Day underway.

He was simply too good for his Brisbane Region team mate Zane Wolpers winning the U11 title 11-2, 11-6, 11-2 in 16 minutes.

Mackay's **Wes Dyer** (2) took on #1 seed Ethan Stephenson in the Boys U15 final. Dyer played out of his skin to win the first game and then recover from 1-2 down to win the U15 State Title 12-10, 7-11, 7-11, 11-6, 11-6 in 57 minutes. Dyer was the only player to beat a #1 seed.

Next up was #2 seed Hayley Hankinson (Mackay) in the Girls U15 final. In her first year in U15 it was always going to be a tough assignment against Brisbane's **Mackenzie Sleep** [1] who is a more seasoned campaigner.

Sleep put the foot down right from the start and never took it off powering away for a 3-0 victory in 22 minutes: 11-2, 11-5, 11-5.

Brisbane's **Charlotte Stephenson** won the Girls U11 round robin. She won all 5 matches and defeated Kayce Hoani-Vincent (3) 11-3, 11-4, 11-2 to finish in first position.

It was now time for the first of the blue ribbon events

... the U19 Girls final between Brisbane's **Taylor Jones** [1] and Southern's Skye Turner [3].

Shooting for two State titles at this year's championship Jones didn't waste any time winning in three 11-4, 11-9, 11-6 in 33 minutes. One down and one to go!

At 11am there were three finals scheduled. Brisbane girls **Ella Burge** [1] and Ashlyn Barclay [2] were to contest the U13 Girls final. Burge proved she is going to be a future star with a comprehensive 11-7, 11-3, 11-9 in 15 minutes!

Showing no ill effects from a slight concussion sustained on Day 2 Mackay's **BJ MacDonald** [1] swept past Luke Eyles [2] in the Boys U13 final 11-2, 11-3, 11-3 in 19 minutes.

Southern Region were delighted when Warwick's **Caleb Johnson** [2] beat Brisbane's Connor McNeill [4] to take the U21 Boys final.

Johnson lost the first, regrouped in the break and then powered away for a great win in four 12-14, 11-6, 11-4, 11-8 (37 minutes).

It was now time for the first of the rising stars to entertain the crowd. With the World Junior Championships his ultimate mission it was important that Brisbane's **Nick Calvert** put together a strong performance. This he did in 50

minutes winning 11-7, 11-2, 11-6. Arscott gave it his all but Calvert was more patient and consistent.

At 1pm it was time to see if Stafford's **Taylor Jones** [1] could win her second title for the day against Zoe Lockton [7]. Jones was ruthless winning the title in 16 minutes 11-1, 11-5, 11-4. Mission accomplished ... title number two was in the bag but little did she know there was more recognition to come!

Both Calvert and Taylor were later recognized for their achievements when they were presented with Eagle Awards. These Achievement Awards are the highest honour a player can receive at the Queensland Junior Championships.

This brought us to the final match of the 2016 Queensland Junior Championships. It was the Boys U19 blue ribbon event.

The final was a tight 30 minute battle but **Alex Eustace** [1] was too good for Jon Van Der Kreek [3] winning 11-9, 11-7, 11-8.

SQUASH PHOTOGRAPHERS

Yes there are so many people who contribute to making a tournament a success.

They range from the volunteers in the canteen to the tournament director to referees and coaches and of course the players. But one that gets very little mention is the person who is charged with the responsibility of capturing the memories ... the photographer!

As a writer of newsletters, I value great shots because they make a publication come alive. They say a picture paints a thousand words. Well a good quality picture will!

Getting good shots in Australia is difficult but not impossible. Yes, squash is one of the most difficult sports to photograph.

The speed of the ball and the racquet make it near impossible to capture action shots without blur especially with an ordinary camera.

Sadly one needs really top notch equipment to take the perfect squash shots like Steven Line at squashpics.com

Unfortunately, there are not too many photographers investing or spending time in squash because the reward for their efforts just isn't there.

So when you come across a good photographer you should do everything

in your power to help and support them.

One shot could be your poster for the next tournament. Action and presentation shots help to capture great memories.

There is nothing worse than a player wins their first tournament and nobody captures the moment. Good shots help with presentations to potential investors (sponsors).

The quality of presentation photos also reflects on the standards and professionalism of an event. If you don't care then don't expect other people especially sponsors to necessarily get right behind you.

Words may not be spoken about the shots you use to promote with but judgments will be made by sponsors.

A potential sponsor will always be concerned with how their brand will be represented and promoted. They don't want their brand associated with a poorly promoted and presented event.

Recently a presentation was made by a promoter in bare feet. That certainly doesn't project an image of our sport caring about standards or looking professional to the business community that our sport relies on to run PSA events and major championships.

SQUASH PHOTOGRAPHERS

One photographer deserving of special recognition is Toni van der Kreek. In short, she is making a significant contribution by photographing our wonderful sport and in particular our juniors.

She may not be classified a professional photographer but she knows how to capture squash shots under difficult circumstances.

As a mum she is giving back to the sport that has been very important to her family. It is her way of getting involved and it certainly passes the boredom of hanging around squash courts when you are not involved as a player or coach.

GOLDEN OPEN: KALGOORLIE WA

The oldest man in the field proved age was no barrier when he took out the 2016 Golden Open.

Evergreen **Mike Corren** was too good for his much younger Korean opponent Ko Youngjo winning 3-0 in 45 minutes.

The 20 year old Youngjo, who created his own slice of history in 2015 by becoming the first Korean to reach a PSA final at the City of Perth International Challenge, was hoping to go one better this time.

After a tight opening game which lasted 22 minutes, Corren put the accelerator flat to the floor winning his 5th Golden Open in 7 years and creating a new age record as the oldest PSA player to win a Tour Final.

SANDGATE OPEN: BRISBANE QLD

NSW's **Tamika Saxby** made it two titles in a row when she won the 2016 Sandgate Open.

Saxby carried her good form from west coast to the east coast of Australia.

In late May at the City of Perth WA Open Saxby upset the #1 seed Sarah Cardwell in the 65 minute final 11-9, 9-11, 11-9, 8-11, 11-5.

In the Sandgate Open she had to deal with Cardwell again but this time after a

tight first game Saxby "changed gears" and powered her way to a 9-11, 11-6, 11-3, 11-5 victory in 41 minutes.

Saxby was then too good for Samantha Foyle winning the semi final 3-0 in a brisk 18 minutes.

Despite a third game hiccup, Saxby was then too strong for Queenslander Lisa Camilleri winning the final in four 11-8, 11-5, 4-11, 11-1 i 37 minutes.
