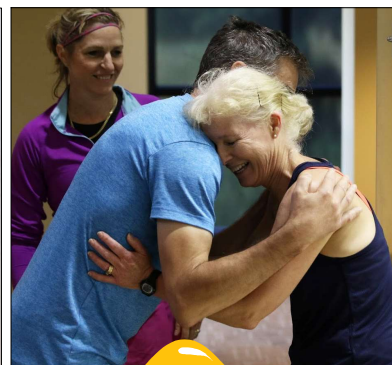

Comments from all our WMC 18 Representatives



Rod Chatfield - Men's O60

Without doubt the WMC was an incredible week. The people, the conversations and the friendliness from those who travelled from all over the world was very evident. At no stage did one feel lonely or misplaced. There was always conversation within and across the age groups. That was my first World Masters Squash experience and hopefully won't be my last. My game is at club level so my expectations for significant success was tempered, never the less the experience of such an event is hard to describe.

Three games was the minimum for any player. So three games I played, didn't win any matches, however, I felt my games were competitive and played in good humour and spirit by all.

The first game was against a professional squash coach from the USA. Nerves for me was a factor, the fear of making a fool of myself was real. The tension in my game created many un-forced errors which helped my opponent move to a three zip victory. One thing can be said, Sue provided words of wisdom and experience helping to relieve the tension. The last game Sue set a target of at least six points. I'm happy to say 9 was the outcome. Sue and co took some delight in this small success!

The second match the nerves were less. My opponent from Brazil was crafty and fit. This needed an improvement in concentration. Less errors were played and the games were closer however alas, three zip. My opponent was a very nice person. We hope to keep in touch.

The final match was against a Plastic Surgeon from the USA. This was the closest and the hardest fought game. The nerves had reduced along with the errors. The game score was 1-3 with the final game yielding a 11-13 result. The competitive spirit in squash players observed at these games was inspiring. The next games are in Poland in 2020. Looking forward to that.

Yvonne Trotter - Women's O65

Charlottesville has been a great event and a fantastic venue, probably the best I've ever seen. I've exceeded my own expectations by making it to the semi finals and eventually coming third. My final match saw me win 11-4, 11-7, 7-11, 12-14, 11-6.

This experience and my results have inspired me to go back and work on my game leading into the WMC in Poland in two years time.

It was great to come home to Australia with a Bronze medal!

Travelling the slow way to the WMC in Charlottesville, Virginia (by train from the west coast of USA), I had the chance to play a few games in San Fransisco, Chicago and Washington. All the local squashies I met on the way were welcoming, and also very optimistic about the future for squash in the United States, which was great to hear.

At the Boars Head Resort, Charlottesville, the sporting facilities are extensive - and all set in peaceful rolling hills of green green grass and forests. As well as all the squash courts, there are 11 indoor tennis courts and many outdoor courts too, and also swimming and golfing facilities. The weather was warm and humid (with a few outburst of torrential rain), so air conditioning indoors was most welcome.

Organisation of Master's matches has been very smooth, and it has been very easy to follow the progress of our little band of West Aussies throughout the tournament (all results and next scheduled matches were immediately available online).

For many players here, a bonus has been the extra matches organised for the less successful (like me!). In all I played 6 matches during the week which made the journey to Charlottesville all that more worthwhile.

The best part of the whole event of course has been the people you meet - maybe it's because we have all been around for a "few" years, but everyone one here (from 55 different countries!) has been friendly and with many interesting stories to tell.

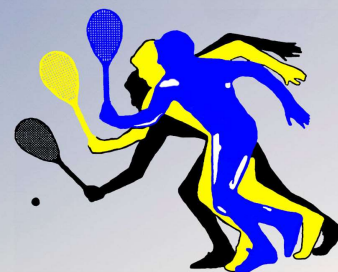

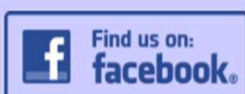

The move South of the River to Curtin

The SRA of WA had negotiated with Curtin to construct a 13 court centre on the grounds of Curtin University with a significant financial contribution by the SRA of WA. Squash

was to receive a 10 year free lease and 10 year extension option of considerable office space and considerable free court usage. Court 13 (display court) had capacity for some 400 viewers.

The change to south of the river to take advantage of the larger 13 court centre, free/cheaper court hire, larger viewing and presentation areas, etc presented significant challenges and brought about many changes.

Club/team shields for winners were introduced in place of individual trophies, managers of the 5 centres had to be informed and court hire negotiated, the Karawara Hall Sunday function organised.

One of the negatives of the change was the necessity of no longer using the centres around Carine Glades etc and the loss of help from in particular Ian Marshall (Court operator Carine) and the Carine Club.

Comments, recollections and points of interest

Contribution from EGSRA (article from Kalgoorlie Miner)

The Golden Open is now one of the richest tournaments in Australia. Over 23 major sponsors banded together with over 60 business houses in the Goldfields to put up the \$5,000 in prize money and donated many of the extras needed to run a tournament of this magnitude.

There were 320 players in the Open this year – an increase of 70 on last year. However of that 320 only 24 were local players.

Tournament chairperson Lesley Lalich said “unless new courts were built between now

and next year's event they would have to cut the entries to about 330".

The six YMCA courts, two Hannans courts and one court at Agricola College were in constant use on the Saturday and Sunday.

“This year we only planned to have three open divisions” she said “but the entries were so great we expanded that to four”.

“we also had junior and senior men's and women's divisions”.

“each one of the 14 event winners received trophies and all the division champions received gold nuggets”.

A feature of the Golden Open was the friendship and togetherness of players.

Dean Williams in his victory speech said it was one of the tournaments he enjoyed the most around the world and he would be back in 1982.

It was one of the richest events in Australia, though not the biggest and he commended the organisers and sponsors for the hard work they had put into the planning.

Steve Bowen: I remember becoming President of Northam in 1980 and therefore attended the delegates meeting at DSR Perry Lakes on the Friday night before Countryweek 1980. I had played in about three Countryweeks by then.

The main topic at these Delegated meetings appeared to be “who will run Countryweek next year?” All of the larger towns had run several so the members turned to me and said “must be Northam's turn!”.

The SRA Constitution at that time stipulated that the President of the Country Club running Countryweek was invited to sit on the WA Board. So I turned up at the start time (7.30pm) and it concluded at around 1am for me to drive home to Northam.

The ongoing issue of lengthy discussions was - Is an under 19 player to be treated as a Junior or a Senior? That was enough for me and the next time I went to a board meeting was in November 1998.

I did get invited to the opening of the new Curtin Squash centre with Dean Williams playing Geoff Hunt.

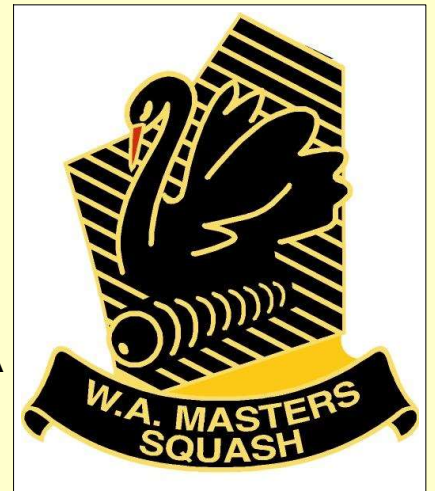
WA MASTERS UPDATE

However, while Marion's official role was that of secretary, her contribution went much further than that. Marion kept track of everything

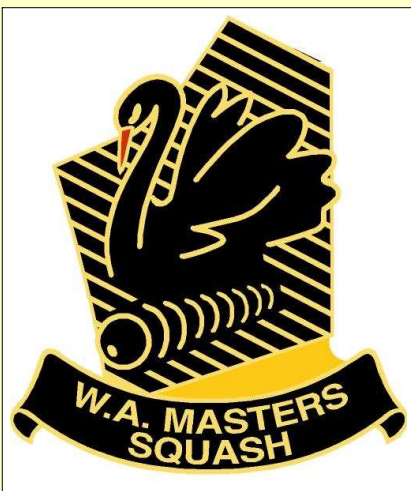

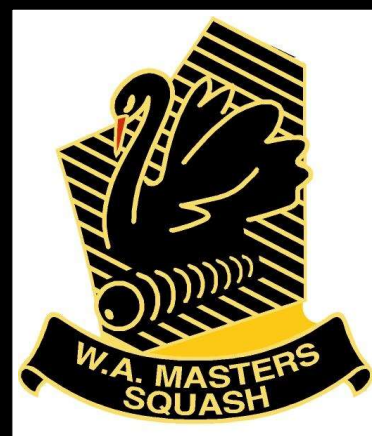

Report by Michaela Pratt

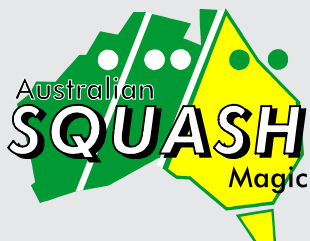

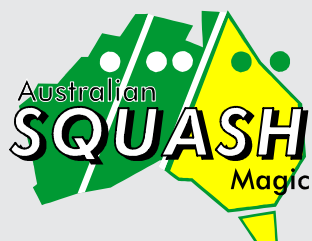
