2018 Highlights



The **Australian Squash Player Annual** has been created and compiled by Kim Schramm for **Squash Media**.

2018 began brilliantly when our Golden Girl **Donna Urquhart** won the PSA 25 Cincinnati Gaynor Cup beating Victoria Lust (W#16) in the final 3-0.

On home soil the Australian Squash Tour got underway with the running of the Australian National Championships. Both **Rex Hedrick** and **Christine Nunn** were too good for their opponents winning their respective finals 3-0 in 23 minutes.

March saw Christine Nunn continue her good form by winning the PSA 5 Sandgate Open and then travelling over to Malaysia to win the PSA 10 Malaysian Tour #6 event.

That brought us to the Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast. WOW what a spectacle! The main court was simply awesome and it was so good to see world class squash being played in Queensland again.

Once again Australia had success in Doubles with Yamba's Cameron Pilley and Donna Urquhart winning the Mixed Doubles GOLD MEDAL on the Saturday Night and local hero Zac Alexander and legend David Palmer taking the Men's Doubles GOLD on the Sunday night.

Queenslander Rachael Grinham and Donna Urquhart took BRONZE in the Women's Doubles.

After the Games **Donna Urquhart** and **Tamika Saxby** got married. Donna married Scotland's Greg Lobban (World Top 50 player) and Tamika married Andrew Hunt.

May saw Rex Hedrick take his good form from the Commonwealth Games into the PSA 10 ACT Open where he won every match including the final in three. Christine Nunn also took her good form from the Commonwealth Games and won a double: the PSA 10 NT Open and the PSA 5 CourtTech Classic in NZ.

June was a quiet month but **Jessica Turnbull** broke through for her maiden PSA title with a solid performance at the PSA 5 Golden Open in Kalgoorlie.

Josh Larkin got back into the winners circle in July with victory in the PSA 5 South Australian Open whilst **Christine Nunn** was doing what she does best ... winning! This time she added the PSA 5 Bendigo International to her ever expanding trophy cabinet.

That brought us to the pinnacle event on the Australian Squash Tour calendar ... the Australian Open.

Despite the event only being a PSA 10 it is still the title players want to win. To be able to have your name engraved on the trophy with so many legends, stars and heros from the past is truly something to aspire to.

Well **Rex Hedrick** did it this year and did it well. He beat Switzerland's Dimitri Steinmann in a high quality final 3-0 to lift the title for the first time.

The following weekend **Rex Hedrick** travelled to Bega to beat Steinmann again but this time in the semi final 3-0 before tackling

Josh Larkin in the final where he dropped a rare game in the 72 minute battle. What a successful run ... two PSA 10 titles in 11 days!

September saw **Christine Nunn** at it again ... winning more titles! This time it was the PSA 5 Roberts & Morrow North Coast Open. For the first time the event gave the winner an automatic entry into next year's World Championship in Chicago USA.

The World Championship draw is made up of the top 56 ranked players, 7 invitees who are the winners of World Qualification Tournaments and one Wildcard position.



So Christine Nunn has a definite spot in the 2019 World Championship draw!

After a somewhat disappointing Commonwealth Games our best Mens player Ryan Cuskelly hit some well timed form to take out the PSA 30 Chicago Open. It was great to see Ryan back and winning.

Despite a number of domestic events on offer in October Aussie players could not secure a win. We had to wait until December to see who would win the Australian Squash Tour Finals.

There were no surprises. **Rex Hedrick** and **Christine Nunn** were simply too good and fully deserved their prizemoney cheques of \$3,000.

Well overall the year wasn't too bad. The highlights were the Gold Medal performances of **Zac Alexander & David Palmer** and **Cameron Pilley & Donna Urquhart** at the Commonwealth Games and the emergence of **Rex Hedrick** and **Christine Nunn** as consistent winners particularly on the domestic circuit.

Let's hope 2019 brings even greater success for our players.

Only three men won titles in 2018. Rex Hedrick was our best securing 3 PSA 10 wins. Ryan Cuskelly finished the year on a high taking out a PSA 30 event. Josh Larkin won one PSA 5 event.

Overall, our players could only secure 13 PSA titles which took us back to our 2015 achievements.

Events must be PSA 5 and above

To qualify for points a player must reach the **quarter finals** as a minimum qualification Excludes Australian Closed and other Closed events

No Doubles

Tie - Countback number of events won - still tied joint winners

A player who plays in a PSA event and is not a PSA member is included.

A player residing in Australia but representing another country is excluded.

Cincinnati Gaynor Cup Champion Donna URQUHART



NSW's **Donna Urquhart** won her 11th PSA title and her second PSA W25 title in 3 months.

She beat the #2 seed England's Victoria Lust (W#16) in the Cincinnati Gaynor Cup final 3-0.

In December our #1 player won the W25 Monte Carlo Classic and now she has won the W25 Cincinnati Gaynor Cup.

Now 31, Urquhart is having to deal with a number of high flying Egyptian youngsters.

At the Monte Carlo she beat 19 year old Zeina Mickawy (W#37) in the final and at the Gaynor Cup she beat 17 year old Rowan Reda Araby (W#36) in the semi.

Urquhart would have been full of confidence in the final having previously beaten Lust at the 2017 Hong Kong Open in straight.

Christine Nunn is the 2018 Australian National Champion. Nunn proved too good for Tamika Saxby winning the final in a blistering 23 minutes dropping just 12 points along the way.

It was an uncharacteristic performance from Saxby who is known for her fighting spirit but nothing can be taken away from Nunn's clinical destruction of the #1 seed.

Victoria's **Rex Hedrick** won the 2018 Australian National Championship (PSA National Closed Satellite) in Melbourne. The #1 seed was too good for #2 seed Josh Larkin winning the final in straight in 23 minutes.

In fact, Hedrick didn't drop a game during the Championship.

Just prior to the Commonwealth Games Christine Nunn won two PSA events.

Firstly, she won the Sandgate Open before travelling to Malaysia to win the Malaysian Tour #6 tournament.

At the Sandgate Open (PSA 5) Nunn proved her 3-0 win in February's Australian Nationals against Tamika Saxby was full of merit. At the time the W#55 was too good for the W#57 winning the final in four.

With every tournament Nunn looks like she is getting back to the form that saw her reach a career high 36 in July 2016.

Seeded #7 in Malaysia (PSA 10) Nunn was on a mission! She beat the #3 seed in the Quarters before despatching the #1S 3-0 in the semi final in a brisk 26 minutes. In the final she beat the #6S Egyptian Hana Moataz in four in 41 minutes.

ACT Open Champion Rex HEDRICK

In April Victorian **Rex Hedrick** represented Australia at the Commonwealth Games and performed well to reach the 3rd round as an unseeded player. He lost that round to #8 seed Alan Clyne (Scotland).

In the CG first round he defeated the #13 seed, former World Junior Champion Eain Yow Ng (MAS) 13-11, 6-11, 8-11, 11-9, 12-10 in 93 minutes! That win proved Hedrick had the physical and mental toughness to persist. So it was no surprise to see him win the ACT Open beating all his opponents in straight.

He beat #5 seed Addeen Idrakie (Malaysia) in the final in a brisk 35 minutes.

"It's been a tough week, I've managed to get through each match 3-0 but none have been easy, they've all been hard fought and could have gone either way but I was able to keep control," said Hedrick.

Commonwealth Games team mates **Christine Nunn** and former World Champion Rachael Grinham fought out the final of the PSA 10 NT Open.

The two last met at the Australian Open in November 2017 where the more experienced Grinham won the semi final comfortably 11-7, 11-5, 11-9 in 29 minutes. Grinham went on

to take the title.

Since then Nunn has been on fire winning three PSA events before the Commonwealth Games (Australian Nationals, Sandgate Open and the Malaysian Tour #6). At the Games she lost a close contest in the 3rd round to Donna Urquhart in five: 11-6, 4-11, 11-7, 6-11, 5-11 (59m).

The NT Open win is her 4th title for the year and her 7th career title.

Christine Nunn is powering forward. After success at the NT Open earlier in the month, the W#53 has taken out the PSA 5 CourtTech Classic in Auckland, New Zealand.

Nunn reached the final with a strong but tough win against Jemyca Aribado, the best female player from the Philippines. Nunn was in control up 2-0 before losing the third 12-14. She "steadied the ship" and closed out the match 11-7 in 44 minutes.

The final was a different story with Nunn dominating her Kiwi opponent Kaitlyn Watts taking the title 3-0 in a brisk 25 minutes.

What a year it has been for the 27 year old. Five titles and a 3rd round appearance at the Commonwealth Games. She is slowly but surely closing in on her career high of W#36 which she achieved in July 2016.

Queensland's **Jessica Turnbull** has broken through to win her maiden PSA title.

The 22 year old received an early birthday present when she beat Malaysian Wen Li Lai in four to take out the 2018 Golden Open in Kalgoorlie.

It was a strong performance by Turnbull to firstly beat #1 seed Sarah Cardwell in a tough semi final and then back up and defeat the



Malaysian who had secured her place in the final by beating #2 seed Tamika Hunt (Saxby) 16-14 in the fourth.

Turnbull joined the PSA in 2010 and received an initial ranking of 252. She has now built that to #69 in the world (PSA July Rankings). She broke into the World Top 100 in July 2012.

For the past six years Turnbull's world ranking has hovered between 73 and 103. She has now broken into the Top 70 and has her sights set on breaking into the World Top 50. It just shows persistence pays off.

Rex Hedrick is the Australian Open Men's Champion for 2018.

The 3-0 score line didn't accurately reflect the evenness of the Men's Open final, which was won in 61 minutes by top seed and local Melbourne favourite Hedrick against tournament third seed, Dimitri Steinmann.

It was a case of third time lucky for the 29-year-old, as he finally secured a major tournament win in his home state following runner-up results at Mulgrave in the 2016 and 2017 Victorian Opens.

As is often the case with a match involving Rex Hedrick, long, grinding rallies were the order of the day, with both players engaging in a tight tussle from the outset. It was Hedrick who settled first in the match however to take the first game, before Switzerland's Steinmann found his groove in the second with some terrific strokes.

In fact, Steinmann looked set to claim the second game at 8-10, before Hedrick dug deep to win the next four points and subsequently the all-important game.

While Steinmann continued to fight on in the third, the missed opportunity in the second proved to be a huge body blow, with Hedrick going from strength-to-strength to close out the match in three: 11-4, 12-10, 11-5.

Rex Hedrick won his second title in just over a week when he took out the PSA 10 Tarra Kia Bega Open. Hedrick dropped the second game in the final against Josh Larkin but was always in control of the 72 minute final.

Most impressive was his semi final win against Dimitri Steinmann who he beat 3-0: 11-8, 11-6, 11-4 in 58 minutes. (33 points won compared to 18 points lost).

It demonstrated his consistency having beaten Steinmann 11-4, 12-10, 11-5 in 61 minutes in the final of the Australian Open. (34 points won compared to 19 points lost).

In the final game both girls traded volleys and used the corners well looking to create a slender opening and at 7-5 Christine won two vital points with well directed shots to the forehand to take a stranglehold on the match and ultimately clinch the title in five games.
