



During August I attended a two day course at AIM on "Change Management" courtesy of DSR which was very enlightening in this ever changing world we live in. Thank you to the DSR for this very generous offer. Sue Hillier and I also attended a "Gender Diversity" breakfast once again put on by DSR and State Government. Great speakers and it was very well attended with around 100 people there.

The new Spring season nominations are closing soon with start dates around the 16th of September. A junior forum was held on Saturday the 24th of August to go through the details of the State Junior Team going to Singapore in December and the State Coaches were named . Amanda Hopps for the girls and Tim Cowell for the boys . This trip we hope will be the test case for more exciting trips in the future to locations near Perth which will broaden our players experiences and open their eyes to what is happening right on our doorstep.

In keeping with my theme as a touring Professional and telling stories of some great moments, I thought I would relive with you the greatest squash match (in my opinion) ever and that was the final of the **1981 British Open when Geoff Hunt of Australia was up against the young Jahangir Khan**. In the lead up events to that British Open Geoff had lost and beaten JK but Geoff was setting himself to break the record of 7 which he held with Hashim Khan. I was lucky to be there for that match as I had been beaten by JK in the quarter finals so all the Aussies stayed on to see Geoff try and break the record.

That match is still vivid in my memory as the greatest match I have ever seen due to the relentless pressure Geoff applied with the most amazing retrieving by JK we had seen. Geoff got on top early and lead 2-0 but there were signs of fatigue as the pace had been awesome. JK got the 3rd game and led in the fourth and we all thought that Geoff had gone too hard too early and was looking like going to a fifth which was not going to be good for him. In what was an amazing comeback Geoff saw that JK also was slightly fatigued and he pounced at the right time to take the fourth 9/7 in an unbelievable victory giving him his 8th title. We were all so excited at having witnessed what we thought and still do, as the greatest match ever. Geoff was 34 yo at the time and JK was 17 yo. As we all know JK went on from there and won the next 10 straight British Opens which is the record to this day. Sadly, Geoff never really recovered from that match and retired in early '82, making a comeback from injuries in 1985 but could not reach the heights he once enjoyed. **Wonderful memories!!!**

These few days have definitely become one of the most memorable moments of my life. It was an honour to be selected to represent Australia to play in the World Junior Championship which was held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia this year.

It was a surreal experience for me to participate in one of the biggest junior tournaments in the world and competing against the top players across different countries. I was happy with my performance over there, however, I thought I could've performed better for some of my matches. The stay with the Australian team was also really fun

and exciting. I also made a lot of new friends, not only with players from other states of Australia but also with players from all over the world.

### **GREG CHAN: MY WJC JOURNEY**

Two weeks ago I set off to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia for the World Junior Championships along with the Australian team. As excited as I was, I wasn't sure whether I was quite ready to take on the best players in the world. Sure enough I went on to play the first round and also one of the best matches in my life, winning in 5.

Unfortunately I couldn't hang on to that against a 9/12 seeded player I faced in the second round.

Luckily, I managed to dig up that mindset from match 1 to win in 5 again in my 3rd match. Due to a recent injury, my world junior journey ended there, finishing at 48th place.

Fortunately the road to recovery has been treating me well and I'll be back to training in no time. I've learnt so much from watching the top players in the world and also from my awesome coaches Paul Price and Kay Kendall. Special thanks to my parents, and my sponsors, Salming and Squash Australia for all that they do.

### ERIN CLASSEN: MY WJC DIARY

I had the privilege of representing Australia at the World Junior Championship In Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia from July 26 - 5 August 2019.

**Pre-tournament routine:** Wake up, be at the restaurant at 8am for breakfast, go back to our rooms to chill for a little bit, get ready to go to the squash courts, arrive at the squash courts for one hour of training, go back to the hotel and go out to get some lunch, having fun interacting with everyone, chill, stretching recovery in the gym, have the option to go for a second hit at the squash courts, go out and have dinner or go to the restaurant in the hotel.

**Opening ceremony:** The night before the tournament started, we had an opening ceremony where we met all the other countries. We had a lovely evening whilst having dinner amid taking lots of photos.

The first day of tournament: When we first arrived at the courts, it was buzzing with players from all the different countries. I had already gotten to know some of them, which was nice. For my first round, I was very excited and didn't know what to expect from my South African opponent, Faith Sithole. I was fired up to win and was 2-0 up but my opponent picked up her game and evened the score 2-2. I was nervous but I really wanted to win. I took the match 3-2 and was so happy and couldn't believe I had won my first round in my first World Junior Championship! I had the good fortune of being coached by the Australian coach Paul Price, who quickly understood my game very well and gave me huge support and advice. Now I was in the top half (1-64) of the draw.

During the first day, I watched many players from USA, ENGLAND, EGYPTIAN, HONG KONG, SOUTH Africa, FRANCE and many more. The level of squash I saw blew me away - especially the Egyptians as they are extraordinary!

**Second day:** My next opponent was Elise Lazarus (England) who was seeded 5/8. I knew she was going to be very tough and I was way more nervous. Unfortunately I lost 0-3 against Elise as she was a much better player then my first opponent, and I didn't have the answers as she kept me pinned to the back court with excellent length, looking for the volley to take me short. I learnt first-hand what the next level I have to attain to is - pace, accuracy, take the ball as early as possible, and fast movement all over the court.

That day, I also got a photo with the number 1 seeds from Egypt - Hania Elhammamy and Mostafa Asal. I was very excited to meet them!

With my second round defeat, I moved down to the 32-64 placings.

**Third day:** I didn't have a match as I had a bye, which was ideal as I could recover my body with stretching, as well as watch amazing squash and support the Australian team!

**Fourth Day:** I was ready to play against a top Malaysian player- Ainaa Ampandi. I was pumped! I was so ready to win but unfortunately she was too good and I lost 0-3. I was devastated! Aiea played very well with a smart-thinking game plan against me. My match play came to an end and my final placing was top 40-48 place and I was the top finisher for all Australian girls. Overall, I was still very happy with my achievement at my first World Junior Championships . I still have four more years of playing the WJC and have many goals ahead to achieve, and one of them is to become a World Junior Champion!

During the remaining few days, I had training in the morning with the Australian team members and supported the others who were still playing. I had the privilege of watching the quarterfinals and semifinals, with the last day of the tournament extra special, with watching the top Egyptians play. The Egyptians are so strong and are unbeatable at the moment with their accuracy, coverage, creativity and court craft.

After the tournament, the Australian team had fun and went to the Boulevard shopping centre. I joined a few of the Australians on a tour to the Batu caves and the KL twin towers. That was a fun experience!

Last day: Before flying back to Perth, I went and supported the Aussie girls playing in the Team events against Canada. The support worked and the Aussie team got away with a win!

Later on, it was time for me to leave and I sadly said goodbye to everyone. The WJC was simply the greatest experience of my life, having learnt so much of what it takes to be an elite squash player and having shared so many special moments with my Australian teammates and having made so many new friends from players around the world. I just can't wait to step onto the ultimate world junior stage again next year!

The night commenced with a talk from guru Neil "no let" Butler and then myself (Michaela) and Carolyn Thompson played a couple of games, demonstrating what not to do when playing (foot faults, strokes etc) for people to practise their new refereeing skills.

Then the big guns took to the court, Bunbury's Jamie Herring and the Bookas Kane Fasalo. The two played a ripper of match, with both players on their haunches at times after searching rallies, Jamie winning 14-12 in the fifth.

Rumour has it at 12 all, Kane whispered in Jamie's ear "I just can't do this anymore." Fortunately, not all was lost, as Kane was the winner of the fitbit challenge, travelling the greater distance (2. Something kilometres) and winning himself a new pair of shoe laces.

It was a great night for all who attended, showcasing great talent and fitness and the camaraderie that squash is renowned for. Kudos to Trevor Cruickshank for formulating the plan and thank-you to the Narrogin squash Committee for making it happen.

The next day, Narrogin hosted the Narrogin Junior Squash Tournament, sponsored by the Shire of Narrogin and Coles Narrogin, in conjunction with the South West Grand Prix. 26 juniors played with clubs such as Moora, Bunbury, Bluegum, Maddington/Gosnells and Mandurah represented.

I have to say, the Match of the Day had to go to Trevor Eastwood and Ashton Clements. All the games were close, with several going to tie-breakers and the fifth game was won by Narrogin's Trevor 14-12. This match also determined the final placing for Division 4.

Division 3 was dominated by Bunbury, with Energetic Eva French overcoming Lively Lee Stone in the final. Division 2 was won by local Caitlin Pratt with Hannah Slyth, from Bluegum taking home the second-place trophy.











In Division 1, Jackson Kiely showed his running game is up to speed winning two of his matches in tie-breaks in the fifth. Second place was a tie on both games and points, but as this division used a round robin format, Daniel Marsh was declared runner up, based on a head to head result, leaving an unlucky but rapidly improving Dewald Vorster in third.

Big thanks to Mr Robins, who crafted the unique trophies for the event, the French Fam for running the tournament and Andrew Pratt (my Dad) for helping on the day. On Sunday, Dad seemed to have a sore back, he said it was from years of carrying me and my sister. I think it was the unaccustomed vacuuming he did over the course of the weekend!

Ray played pennants at the Thornleigh Squash Centre during the 80s and 90s when squash was at its peak. He continues to thoroughly enjoy his squash, entering all the Masters events and playing in the Blue Gum Friday night competition every week, where he also manages the Blue Gum Social bar (a most important role).

Ray is also off to the Gold Coast to compete in the Teams event together with Graham Follington and Greg Mills. Sounds like a strong team to me. He says he is 65 now, and is keen to keep playing competitive squash "for as long as my body lets me", and he has plenty of wonderful role models in WA Masters Squash to encourage him along the way well into his eighties and nineties.

After a full and varied working life Ray is now retired, leaving Toll Australia in 2015. He is thoroughly enjoying his retirement and is staying active and involved by very generously contributing back to the WA community. Twice a week Ray works as a volunteer with St Patrick's (homeless people) in Fremantle, and every Friday he volunteers with Chorus (Meals on Wheels). These are both such genuine, necessary and worthwhile organisations, and I can only imagine how both challenging and rewarding this work is. It takes a very special person to commit their time and service on such a regular basis to these organisations.

Besides all other commitments and responsibilities, Ray's favourite pursuit (apart from playing squash, of course) is travelling with Michele. They have recently returned from a five-week jaunt in Europe, and are already planning the next adventure. That would be after the National Masters ...
