# Dean's Diary

August has been a fantastic month with a full month of pennants and league being played as well as of course our very prestigious WA Open. Centres are experiencing renewed enthusiasm for squash and bookings are healthy and sales of equipment are going very well which is always a very good indication that people are booking courts and playing competition.

The WA Open got me thinking about the Amateur and Professional era's and its a history that we cannot ignore because players who crossed over to professionalism were in some ways disadvantaged. For example Geoff Hunt's record is always compared to Jahangir Khan's who is regarded as the Greatest Of All Time (the GOAT).

Geoff broke Hashim Khans British Open record of 7 titles when he defeated Jahangir in 1981 to win his eighth. Jahangir went on and won 10 straight from 1982 -1991. Geoff didn't play a few British Opens in the late 60's as he was an Amateur and wanted to play for Australia in the World Teams Titles which started in 1967 (Geoff went on to win the first 3 Titles in 1967, 69 and 71).

He was "invited" to play in the British Open as an Amateur in 1969 and won his first title but was not allowed to collect any prizes as this would have turned him professional. Geoff's next win was in 1974, 3 years after turning pro. Jonah Barrington was a pro and therefore was unable to play for Ireland or England in the 1971 World teams Titles.

So from 1971 to 1981 Geoff could not play at all in the Australian Amateur Title as he was a pro until the 1st of September 1980, when the Governing body of squash (the ISRF) announced that Squash was "open". He won it again in 1980 and 1981 (I was the unfortunate runner up on both occasions) and then he retired due to injury in 1982.

So if you could guess, I'm sure Geoff would have won all the Aussie titles in that time to amass a record which would have never been broken but as it stands Ken Hiscoe has the record. The World Open as we know it today had a rocky start and the stats of today include the ISRF World Amateur Title which Geoff won 3 times but it was only played every 2 years!!


Geoff won the first 3 titles over a 6 year period ... today its played every year! The very first official World Open was combined with the British Open in 1976 which Geoff won by defeating Mohibullah Khan in an epic 5 setter, so Geoff won 2 titles in the one victory.

The world open was not played in 1978 but from then on it was played every year. Geoff won every World Title that he played in until losing to the great Jahangir Khan in Canada in 1981 if 4 games. So the record shows Geoff won 7 World Titles, but in that time he could not play in 7 years as it was not played or he was a professional and the ISRF was the only recognised World Title.

So in my humble opinion Geoff Hunt could quite possibly have won at least 12 World Titles and 10 British Opens to stake a claim as the GOAT. You need to know history so as an informed decision might be made.

Just to emphasise my point ... just imagine how many Grand Slam Tennis Titles Ken Rosewall or Rod Laver would have won if they were allowed to play. Rod missed 24 Grand Slams whilst being a professional and Ken missed more than 36. Gives you something to think about doesn't it??



After all the drama this year it was absolutely fantastic to be able to hold the 70th Men's WA State title and the ladies 67th continuously run titles. There was a time when it looked like we may not be able to hold this prestigious event and WA Squash took the decision to hold the WA Open even though we knew that with our borders closed and we were not going to attract any interstate or overseas players we felt that this event had to be held over and above any other event. If we can play all the other events before the end of the year it will a huge bonus.

WA Squash would like to sincerely thank the Mirrabooka club and centre for holding a wonderful tournament with over 180 entries in many divisions. The event was played in tremendous spirit which the referees loving the fact that we did not have any disputes!

The WA Open has been going since 1951 when in a Jubilee year the great John Freedman won his first title. It was of course an Amateur title until 1981 when the ISRF and Squash Australia announced that professionals could play. I for one was so happy to play again after missing 4 years whilst I was on the World tour. This great trophy was used for the 'Open" and so recognising the history of the event.

2020 WA Open was memorable for two reasons. Firstly, we had a Ladies final between coach and pupil and we crowned a new champion in Amanda Hopps who defeated last year's winner Erin Classen. This win meant a lot to Amanda who has been runner up on many occasions and now to have her name on the trophy adds to a great career. In 1988 Amanda became the second only WA junior girl to win the Australian Junior title and in 2014 became World over 45 champion.

The 70th consecutive playing of the Mens Championship was won by Mike Corren who equalled Dean Williams' record of 9 Titles. It was a tremendous effort from the State number one and he was all class in his victory over David Ilich 3/0. Mike's experience and skill level is worthy of a former top 30 in the world on the PSA tour and all his shots were on display in a clinical performance considering no one had had any real match play for months. Well done Mike .

A huge thank you also to the volunteers behind the canteen, the refs and markers, and a massive thanks to Kane Fasolo, who was the tournament Director, for an amazing job well done. With the State Closed due to be played on 2/3 rd of October we may well see a repeat performance from Amanda and Mike.







As WA continues on its merry 'hard lockdown' way, so does WA Masters Squash. We didn't even let a pandemic, epic though it is, stand in the way of important milestone celebrations, and all the tournaments we are endeavouring to squeeze into the shorter timeframe we are working with this year.

### WA Masters 40th Celebration

The WA Masters 40th Celebration, from its inception, was destined to be a wonderful, memorable occasion for many reasons, not the least of which being the involvement of our loyal, talented, fun-loving Masters cohort. Equally responsible, though, is the utmost determination and dedicated effort of our committed Masters Committee to make it so. An excellent recipe for a successful evening.

The Pagoda was a fitting choice of venue for this special occasion. It has a rich history in WA, and many of us would remember it as the Pagoda Ballroom; however, it was originally built as tea rooms in the 1920s. The building also served as living quarters for soldiers during WWII. After the war it reopened and became a popular ballroom and reception centre. It has since housed roller skating, jazz music, ballroom dancing and weddings before arriving at its current status with the building now restored, in its unique Edwardian Oriental style, housing the Pagoda Restaurant and Bar. Many of us have fond memories of the place for one reason or another, and can now add yet another.

It was fantastic to see so many people joining in the celebrations; it was great to see the close to 100 past and present Masters players who attended thoroughly enjoying the evening, catching up with friends not seen for a while and sharing memories and news.

The formal part of the evening was woven into the gaps between the delicious three course meal that we were all served. Masters Committee Chair, Roger Campbell, welcomed everyone and guided us through a potted history of WA Masters Squash, shining a light on people who have been instrumental in starting, supporting and sustaining Masters. It was great to see many of those people in attendance.

Out first Australian champion was Jenny Felton, who won the over 40 age group. In 1979 the Australian Squash Championships were held at Balga Squash Centre, and included Juniors and Masters. 
