May was another huge month for WA Squash as we have finally moved office from Westminster to Belmont Squash Centre. The old club rooms have been converted into 4 work stations and once again a big thanks to Russell Chandler and Vic Thomas for putting up a wall and making the space usable. It is certainly going be a lot better than where we have been operating from for nearly 2 and a half years.

I also have to thank Q-BIT and Fabio Suffell for the deal we had at Westminster as it has saved WA Squash a lot of money whilst we have worked hard to put the Association back into the black and on a very secure financial footing. We are all able to now work remotely as we have finally updated all our IT which will enable more efficient response time to clubs and to not be frustrated with out dated software which was not supported. Thanks to Leigh Kaye who took on this challenge and has brought it in on time and under budget.

The month started with the Geraldton Open on the 1st and 2nd of May with Mike Corren defeating Dave Ilich in the final and we saw a new ladies winner in Isla Harris who defeated Lisa Christou. This tournament is interesting because it may have determined some new names in the eventual Top 8 Shoot out "points race" so we will have to see how the Golden Open goes which will be the last event before we determine the top 8.

Sue Hillier went to Broome as part of our Healthway regional programs and club development programs which saw about 7 new coaches do the foundation course and one do the club development course. Great to see as Broome has a great club and a huge junior following but is in need of qualified coaches.

Whilst there Sue played in the Broome Invitational Classic and I'm sure if she hadn't been a little bit injured with her ankle she may have followed Sarah Fitz-Gerald in taking out the title ... may be next year Sue ??

Between the 21st -23rd of May we were visited by Squash Australia's high performance team in Stewart Boswell, Jenny Duncalf and Lachlan Johnston for a 3 day "camp" of coaching, drills, physical testing and tactical work. Some of our players found it tough and a glimpse into what it takes to be a squash player.

Friday night was a very specific "one on one" coaching with 5 elite juniors who have been chosen in squads as part of the pathway to hopefully represent Australia in World Junior events. After that Friday session our awesome Board member Katy Scott managed, with some influence, to arrange a great night at the RAC arena to watch the Perth Wildcats and socialise with the team from Squash Australia.



All the Autumn Pennant teams and League teams comps were playing semi-finals and Grand Finals which were all completed in early June and we will have a full list of winners in the next SWAN.

The WA Open was played at Belmont Squash Centre from the 28th to the 30th of May and I have a full report in this edition but it just highlighted what a busy month it was. With the restrictions on travel so very relevant we need to look closely as to when the WA Open is played. If we are not going to attract any interstate or overseas players there is no need for the Open to be a PSA event or have it near the Golden Open as we do not want to have too many events in such a short time. I would love to see the Open played a little later in the year and fill a spot in November so as to have something that the players can really strive for.


To finish my monthly article as always I try to tell of some interesting stories that I encountered as a touring pro for just on 14 years and one that came to mind the other day when looking up the results of the NT Open was when we used to play the Alice Springs Open and the NT Open back to back.


It attracted many good players as the prize money was \$1,000 dollars for the winner plus 2 Pan Am return tickets from Australia to the UK. The fields were very strong in both mens and ladies but the real attraction was to see who could get up Ayres Rock (now Uluru) the quickest !!

It was a competition every year and if you have ever climbed the rock you will know its not that easy but I did it twice and my best time was 18 minutes but Bruce Brownlee (world #7) did it in 17

minutes. There was a rock cairn at the top with a book in it to lodge your time and at the time he was the fastest.

The tournament was just the best event you could play as the best players were there and in some years we had 4 or 5 players in the top 10 in the world in 1981 to 1984. I was lucky to win 3 Alice Springs Opens in my time beating the likes of Chris Dittmar, Ross Thorne, Cam Nancarrow and Bruce Brownlee (NZ).







ADMINISTRATION Dean's Diary



From there we went to Darwin and one of the funniest finals I ever played was in 1981 when I played Steve Bowditch from Darwin who was an indigenous player and who had just won the last ISRF Amateur World Title in Sweden that year. We played at the Darwin Squash Centre on a very hot day which was made worse when we learned the airconditioning had broken down.

The conditions were so oppressive that the organisers said we should cancel it but Steve

and I said we were happy to play if they could take the door off the glass back wall so as to let some outside fresh air in and if the ball went out then we would just play a let as we both thought that if were bad enough to hit the ball down the middle of the court then we really should have a good long look at ourselves !!!

The game went ahead and it was HOT ... both of us suffered the heat and humidity and I'm happy to say that the ball only went through the "hole" twice and I am sure it was done on purpose by each of us to get a rest !!!

Happy to say I got him that day 3-0, it's the only time I ever played without a back door !!! Steve Bowditch was inducted into the Australian Squash Hall of Fame a few years ago and I feel we haven't made enough of the fact that Squash has had a World Champion indigenous player.

The 2021 WA Open Squash Championships were held at Belmont Squash and Sports Centre from the 27th to the 30th of May.

Belmont has 8 courts and a magnificent history in squash in WA for nearly 50 years as it held the 1973 Australian Amateur Championships which saw the likes of the GOAT ladies player in Heather McKay, Qamar Zaman, Cam Nancarrow and the GOAT in Geoff Hunt who played in the Australian Open which was for professional players. So it was a squash extravaganza in 1973 and now we can add the first time Belmont has held a WA Open.

Whilst entries were a bit on the low side (84) it did not detract from the great atmosphere all weekend. There were 5 divisions in the Mens and 3 in the Ladies plus the PSA Mens and Ladies Open. It was decided to have a PSA event in the hope to attract interstate players chasing points but this did not eventuate and the points were collected by WA Players.

The tournament was a little bit old fashioned as the Open events were "open" to anyone wishing to play which has not happened for a long time. This was a bit confusing for some players who saw better players enter divisions and not the Open, but we will keep this going and to try and educate the players.

There were some notable matches during the weekend in the divisions, one that comes to mind was the play-off for 15th and 16th between Dan Hartigan and Heddwyn Brahma which went all the way to 14-12 in the fifth after Heddwyn led 10-7 in the fifth. Well done Dan !!

Also Caillin Blackwood's great result over the 8th seed Glenn Hitch in 5 tough sets with his reward being to play Mike Corren in the quarters!! Another great game was Remi Young being pushed all the way in the fifth by Brenden Ward.

The ladies semi final between Jo Hitch and Erin Classen was another epic match but once again Erin managed to pull out a gutsy win in 5. Another upset was waiting for us in the Men's semi finals when young Oscar Curtis really dismantled the top seed David Ilich in 4 to reach his first WA Open final.

The finals were played in front of a packed crowd of over 80 people and the atmosphere was fantastic as many were anticipating a bit of a changing of the guard and possibly 2 new winners to go on the honour board.

The ladies final was one of the best for many years as Pascale Louka took a 2-1 lead against Erin Classen and looked in great touch. Erin came back to take a tight 4th game 11-6, and with a few loose errors from Pascale in the fifth, Erin won 11-3 to take out her second WA Open Title to go with her State Closed and her National under 19 title. Well done Erin !!

The Men's final was full of anticipation to see if Oscar could match it with the evergreen champ but Mike was in no mood to lose a game and whilst Oscar came out of the blocks well and led 4-0, Mike tightened the screws and won 11 out of the next 12 points to win the first.

The second was again tight and it looked like Oscar might steal a game but a few wayward errors let Mike in and he took it 12-10.

The third was never in doubt and Mike Corren won it 11-7 to win his 10th WA Open breaking the record of 9 set by yours truly over 35 years ago. It was a pleasure and an honour to present Mike with his 10th title. A truly incredible effort.

A huge thank you must go to **Raelene Marriott** from WA Squash who ran the event. It was the first time for a long time that WA Squash had run its own WA Open and we hope to be able to do this from now on.

To **Lyn and Russell Chandler** who were amazing hosts at BSSC and provided a canteen for players and were so supportive throughout the entire event.

To the refs: **Neil Butler, Pam Addison ,Doug Minchin, Luke Jamieson and Deb Butler** who were all amazing and once again did a great job. Thank you.

"Blood Rule"

WORLD SQUASH SINGLES RULES 2020 (Effective 5 December 2020 V1) At the end of last year WSF introduced a series of changes to the blood rule in Squash. The changes are as follows:

Rule 14.4 Blood Injury updated to read: A Blood Injury is defined as being when bleeding occurs, and the blood flow is sufficient that blood can be transferred from a player to their opponent or the court.

A scrape, graze or nick with no blood flow does not constitute a Blood Injury and play must continue. Visible blood through a bandage, dressing or covering is not considered a Blood Injury.

Once a Blood Injury occurs, the injured player must leave the court and it is the referee's responsibility to ensure that the injured player returns to the court in the shortest time possible, according to the following rules;

14.4.1. Self-inflicted: where the Blood Injury is caused by a player's own action or condition, such as a fall, lunge, dive, crowding, nosebleed or similar, the player is permitted 5 minutes to stem the flow of blood and cover the bleeding.

The referee is in charge of starting the timer, which will start from when the injured player's treatment begins. If the injured player is not ready to resume play after 5 minutes has elapsed, the player must concede the game and take the game interval, if available, for further recovery.

If the same Blood Injury reoccurs, no further recovery time is permitted, and the injured player must concede the game and take the next game interval, if available, for further recovery. If the injured player cannot resume play within the permitted time allowed, the referee will award the match to the injured player's opponent.

14.4.2. Contributed: where the Blood Injury is caused by both players' actions, the injured player has reasonable time to stem the flow of blood and cover the bleeding.

Reasonable time is determined by the referee, who can be assisted by the on-site medical personnel, if available.

If the same Blood Injury reoccurs, through no fault of either player or by both players' actions, the injured player shall have further reasonable time to address the Blood Injury.

If the same Blood Injury reoccurs, due to an action solely by the injured player, the player shall have no further time to address the Blood Injury and must concede the game and take the game interval, if available, for further recovery.

If the injured player cannot resume play within the reasonable time or extended periods allowed, the referee will award the match to the injured player's opponent.

14.4.3. **Opponent inflicted:** where the Blood Injury is caused solely by the opponent;

14.4.3.1. Where the Blood Injury is solely caused by the opponent's accidental action, the injured player has reasonable time to stem the flow of blood and cover the bleeding. Reasonable time is determined by the referee, who can be assisted by the on-site medical personnel, if available.





"Blood Rule"

If the injured player cannot resume play in the reasonable time allowed, the referee will award the match to the injured player.

If the same Blood Injury reoccurs, through no fault of either player or by both players' actions, the injured player shall have further reasonable time to address the Blood Injury.

If the blood flow cannot be stopped in a reasonable time the referee will award the match to the injured player.

If the same Blood Injury reoccurs, due to an action solely by the injured player, the player shall have no further time to address the Blood Injury and must concede the game and take the game interval, if available, for further recovery.

If the injured player cannot then resume play within the reasonable time or extended periods allowed, the referee will award the match to the injured player's opponent.

14.4.3.2. Where the Blood Injury is caused by the opponent's deliberate dangerous play, Rule 15: Conduct must be applied, and the referee will award the match to the injured player.

14.4.4. Where there is a stoppage in play, the court must be cleaned, and bloodstained clothing replaced".

Squash Australia : State Performance Pathway Camp : 21-23 May 2021 at Belmont Squash Centre

Squash Australia High Performance Manager, Lachlan Johnston, National Coach, Stewart Boswell and Performance Pathway Coach, Jenny Duncalf travelled from Brisbane to Perth for a squash camp on the weekend of 21-23 May 2021.

16 athletes took part in this camp with six coming from the regions: Esperance, Karratha, Mandurah, Moora and Narrogin.

Friday night saw a 2-hour session with some individual coaching from Jenny and Stewart for 5 of our top players.

Saturday morning commenced at 9am with all 15 players running through a quick introduction, explanation and emphasising the importance of maximum effort and doing the basics well.

Stewart, Jenny, Lachlan, Leigh Kaye and Sue Hillier took the players through basic routines progressing through the morning session. At lunch time Jenny and Stewart lead a discussion with a group of coaches who were keen to gain some knowledge whilst Lachlan took the players through some movement screening.

In the afternoon session players were tested on their speed and agility. After a tough day of squash some players opted for the ice bath knowing they had to back up the next day.

A BBQ was organised by Squash Australia allowing the players to get to know each other better. Daniel Marsh showed some of his culinary skills with a chicken

Day 2: With many tired bodies a good warm up was on the cards before some squash accuracy sessions and more drills. I think the players learnt quite a lot about their accuracy and will go back wanting to do more solo practice.

Lunch break was welcomed by the players. This was followed by a chat about goal setting and what you need to do to improve your game. A great exercise for the players and something to continually update.
