#### To Oscar Curtis and Daniel Marsh:



A quality field of 31 players saw the top seeds eliminated easily. Seeded 9/16 Daniel beat the #2 seed and one of the 3/4 seeds on his way to the final. His opponent in the final was seeded 5/8 and knocked out the #1 seed and one of the 3/4 seeds along the way.

We have the largest geographic distance to contend with, smaller population than the Eastern states, yet we can stand tall and run three tournaments simultaneously, two of which were national events and two of the biggest tournaments in Australia. Go WA!!

I believe squash in Western Australia is as successful as it is because we have an army of volunteers with as much passion and talent as our junior squash players. No amount of thanks could ever be enough for the time and effort donated by these wonderful human beings.

Country Week this year attracted 211 registrations from 15 towns across the state. As always, the atmosphere at this annual event was electric. Seeing friends from opposite ends of the state embrace and reconnect for the first time in many months was simply heart-warming.

The UniSport National games took place at Belmont Squash Centre (at the very same time as the Australian Junior Championships at Mirrabooka, no less), with universities competing from Tasmania, Victoria, New South Wales, and Western Australia. University of Western Australia (UWA) missed out on top spot by a hair – two points, to finish second place behind University of Tasmania. Our very own Remi Young won the men's only event taking the gold medal in a tightly fought final. Pascale Louka claimed the bronze medal after a more than full week of squash!

To ensure things ran smoothly throughout the four jam-packed days, Raelene Marriott ran the tournament desk, directed traffic, put fires out, rallied the troops and more ...and what an amazing job she did. Without fail, our referees turned up to do the job no one else "wants" to do, so a huge thank you to Neil Butler and Doug Minchin – not to mention the wonderful Les who operated the electronic scoreboard.

AJC's - With the help of a small army of staff and volunteers, the Australian Junior Championships wrapped up on Sunday 2 October with Western Australia's state team coming second place to Queensland's. Some incredible, edge-of-your-seat matches took place during the individual's event and then team's event.

Congratulations to Oscar Curtis – this young phenomenon not only won the MC Hazel Award voted by referees and state managers, but also managed not to drop a single game throughout. We can't wait to see what Oscar's future holds.

# **2022 WA COUNTRY TEAMS**



211 players registered for the largest tournament in Australia – the WA Country Teams Championships. 15 towns were represented from across the State (Broome, Bunbury, Busselton, Dampier, Esperance, Geraldton, Kalgoorlie, Karratha, Katanning, Leschenault, Mandurah, Manjimup, Moora, Narrogin, and Wongan Hills) forming 13 grades of teams.

Matches kicked off at 8.30am on Saturday 24 September and the last finals matches started at 4.30pm on Sunday 25 September before presentations took place, followed by a gourmet buffet dinner and live band. Players then made their way home to their respective hometowns on Monday morning.

The atmosphere, as per each and every year, was incredible. The squash community in WA is as strong and supportive as ever.

#### Individual Championships

The WA kids gave absolutely everything they had at the Australian Junior Championships held at Squashworld Mirrabooka during the September school holidays.

WA's prowess in the under 19 boys division was solidified with Oscar Curtis sailing through the three days in straight sets, defeating QLD's Luke Eyles in the GF 11-4, 11-6, 11-8 (30m). Dylan Classen and Greg Chan had everyone at the edge of their seats in their fight for 3rd/4th, with Dylan coming out on top 11-9 in the fifth. The final score was 4-11, 12-10, 8-11, 11-7, 11-9 (53m)!

Erin Classen just missed out on the top under 19 girls' spot being defeated by QLD's Madison Lyon in three 10-12, 8-11, 3-11 (28m).

Daniel Marsh also cruised through in straight sets, taking out NSW's William Slade for the top under 17 boys' spot 11-5, 11-7, 11-5 (27m). Daniel came in as an underrated player but carved everyone up.

Hashing it out for the 3rd/4th spot in the under 15 boys, Aiden Finlay-Mulligan took a mere 14 minutes to take down VIC's Connor Haberecht in three. Teagan Scott also took only 12 minutes to beat QLD's Abbey Boswell for 3rd place.

#### Referee Luke Jameson:

With that in mind, penalties of 'conduct stroke' were planned to be enforced earlier, and predominantly without conduct warnings being applied first. This show of tough love led to the tournament being a much more enjoyable experience for the players,

coaches, and spectators alike. As a referee I can only hope this level of professionalism demonstrated by the players can continue to future tournaments.

Over the course of the individual event, referees and team managers cast votes on who they believed showed the best performance, courage and sportsmanship each day. This year's boys overall winner was Oscar Curtis on 10 votes, with Dylan Classen coming in a very close second on eight votes. The overall girls winner was a very deserving Sarbani Maitra from QLD. Congratulations to all our WA players who picked up votes during the count – you are all very worthy."

#### Team Coach Paul Kershaw:

# "Rule 15 : Conduct"

Although players' behaviour has improved over the years it still does not hurt to be reminded occasionally of what is expected.

#### Offences

The following actions may give cause for the Referee to award a Conduct penalty:-

- **15.1.** Players must comply with any tournament regulations additional to these Rules.
- **15.2.** Players may not place any object within the court.
- **15.3.** Players may not leave the court during a game without the permission of the Referee.
- **15.4.** Players may not request a change of any Official.
- **15.5.** Players must not behave in a manner that is unfair, dangerous, abusive, offensive, or in any way detrimental to the sport.
- **15.6.** If a player's conduct is unacceptable, the Referee must penalise the player, stopping play if necessary. 15.6.1. audible or visible obscenity;
- **15.6.2.** verbal, physical or any other form of abuse;
- **15.6.3.** *unnecessary physical contact, which includes pushing off the opponent;*
- **15.6.4.** *dangerous play, including an excessive racket swing;*
- **15.6.5.** *dissent to an Official;*
- **15.6.6.** *abuse of equipment or court;*
- **15.6.7.** *unfair warm-up;*
- **15.6.8.** *delaying play, including being late back on court;*
- **15.6.9.** *deliberate distraction;*
- **15.6.10.** receiving coaching during play.

### **Result of Offence**

**5.7.** A player guilty of an offence may be given a Conduct Warning or penalised with a **Conduct Stroke**, a Conduct Game, or a Conduct Match, depending on the severity of the **offence**.

**15.8.** The Referee may impose more than one warning, stroke or game to a player for a subsequent similar offence, providing any such penalty may not be less severe than the previous penalty for the same offence.

**15.9.** A warning or a penalty may be imposed by the Referee at any time, including during the warm-up and following the conclusion of the match.

- **15.10.** If the Referee:
  - **15.10.1.** stops play to issue a Conduct Warning, a let is allowed;
  - **15.10.2.** stops play to award a Conduct Stroke, that Conduct Stroke becomes the result of the rally;



# **Refs Rule with Neil Butler: "Rule 15 : Conduct"**

15.10.3.	awards a Conduct Stroke after a rally has finished, the result of the rally

- 15.10.4. awards a Conduct Game, that game is the one in progress or the next one if a game is not in progress. In the latter case an additional interval of 90 seconds does not apply;
- 15.10.5. awards a Conduct Game or a Conduct Match, the offending player retains all points or games already won;

What every Referee does not want to have to do:-



**AJC:** My full report including various Points of View is included in the event summary. I just want to say here the WA kids gave absolutely everything they had at the AJC. I was so proud of them! The first three days consisted of the Individuals event, with the last 3 days being the teams event, where State's go Head to Head to determine the overall champion. What a Championship it was.

**Unisport Games:** Whilst the AJC had encapsulated the younger squash players, a slightly older generation of players had their own tournament running, the 2022 Unisport Nationals. 5,000 student athletes represented 39 Universities across 26 sports for seven days in Perth. The Squash competition ran for four days, from Tuesday September 27 until Friday September 30. There was a Teams Event, as well as Male and Female Individual Round Robins.



The squash ended up being quite challenging for most players. Some had up to four matches a day, and this, combined with other activities that Unigames is famous for opened up the draws for the competition.

For the Teams event, the UWA Team, known colloquially as UW Club (pronounced as U-Dub Club), consisting of Mitch, Remi, Kobi and Aedan took out the Silver Medal. They had event points and games against the Champions UTAS but lost on matches.

The University of Melbourne took out the bronze medal. For the Singles event, Curtin Carnaby's player Pascale Louka came Third, and UWA's Remi Young was the Men's Champion. As well as being great squash players, the Tassie mob were good sports off the court. They hosted some post squash shenanigans for all squash athletes at the completion of the tournament. I think for many players, when we are older and looking back on our time at Uni, events like these will shine the brightest.

With all tournaments, there are many thank-yous that need to be said. Lovely Les manned the scoreboard every day and for every match and did an incredible job. Doug and Neil did a fabulous job holding the presentations and Michelle and the Belmont Saints Squash Club members kept the athletes fed and the centre clean. Lastly, a massive thank you To Raelene for volunteering to run the entire tournament. She was asked only a few days before the tournament began, and did an impeccable job and keeping the players sorted- and sometimes motivated. Without these people, I could not imagine the tournament being as fun as it was.

Junior Activity Day: Earlier in the month, Vic Park's Mark Rukuata and myself held a stall at Forest Lakes Shopping Centre. We took along an Inflatable Squash Court and set it up in the shopping centre for members of the public to have a try. I would like to thank Mark for his assistance at this event.


