September was another HUGE month for squash in Western Australia.

The **2023 'Country Week' Teams Championships** held from 22 to 24 September attracted the highest number of teams we have seen since 2010. 236 players registered for the largest tournament in Australia - a 12% increase in participation from 2022's 211 players.

15 towns were represented from across the State (Broome, Bunbury, Busselton, Dampier, Esperance, Geraldton, Kalgoorlie, Karratha, Katanning, Leschenault, Mandurah, Manjimup, Moora, Narrogin, and Wongan Hills) forming 14 grades of teams. The Mens grades ran from A through to J, and the Ladies from A through to D. You can read more about the event and see all the photos further on in this edition.

Then before you could blink, the Junior State Team, along with coaches and carers, were on a plane bound for Brisbane, Queensland to compete in the Australian Junior Championships at Daisy Hill Squash Club. It was a fantastic experience for these juniors, that I have no doubt they will never forget. Thank you so much to everyone who contributed financially and/or by volunteering their time to make it all happen.

Oscar Curtis took out the top spot as the #1 junior in the country. **Hannah Slyth** finished 3rd in the GU19 event whilst **Domenic Christou** also placed 3rd in the BU13 draw. Again, results and photos can be found further on. Due to the size of these events and wanting to do them justice, we will be covering the teams event in next month's edition.

Squashathon 2023 kicks off this weekend with 44 juniors registered, a record for this fun event. The participants will take turns in keeping a ball in play for 24 hours, from 2pm Saturday until 2pm Sunday. We've already raised over \$1,500 for junior squash initiatives, and welcome further donations via the website's Squashathon page here: https://squashwa.asn.au/squashathon/

Cambridge Junior Teams

Thanks Tim Cowell. This year was the 5th year of running the Cambridge Junior Teams tournament, taking place on the 16th and 17th September. The build up was positive, Marmion lodged 6 teams, Mirrabooka had heaps and Cambridge's numbers were building. Busselton indicated early they had a novice team pumped up and keen to test their stuff in the novice division.

A few late withdrawals, some swapping of players, some even later withdrawals and finally the last 4 players added the night before gave us 20 teams and 60 entrants. The novice event took place on Saturday arvo; red dot ball, close enough is good enough on the serve and plenty of supervision for both players and the new parents experiencing their first event. The results; lots of fun, some keen kids for future events and a win to Cambridge with Busselton coming 2nd.

The main event also kicked off with round 1 for most divisions taking place Saturday afternoon with the tournament finishing on Sunday afternoon. We saw some impressive squash, especially from first timer Amindi Elvadura who only started at the Cambridge program 2 weeks prior to the tournament, having a monster 5 setter against Antonin from Mirrabooka. Amindi took out the female best and fairest award for her efforts across the weekend!

Jono from Marmion 1 had a rough start and had to pull out of the event with illness. Fin Galt (in his first tournament for a few years) reached out to good mate and history making, former state team mate Jaxon Wells (part of the first WA team to win the AJC teams event) to fill in. Somehow one of the shirts he traded for in 2018 still fitted him, although it was more muscle T than loose fitting! A few cobwebs early but he found some touch for the rest of the event.

The every point matters mantra also was 100% relevant, with the final match of the event in Division 1 coming down to the wire for 2nd place. The end result, 7 games all, 2 matches - 1, 137 points to 136, Mirrabooka's way over Vic Park! Can't get much closer than that!

As for our own Cambridge teams, a great result in the Novice grade, but found it tough going in the other

COACHES CORNER with Tim Cowell

Coaches advice for selecting equipment

This one might seem a tad left field in a coaching article, but selecting the right equipment for you can make a significant difference to your game.

When you look at your kit bag, how would you rank items in terms contributing to your on court performance?

Warm up aids certainly help - skipping rope, resistance bands, reaction balls, foam rollers and maybe a bit of Dencorub or Tiger Balm for the sore spots in a tournament.



Drink bottles - gotta stay hydrated!

As far as on court equipment goes, I would rank shoes slightly ahead of racquets in terms of importance.

What is the right shoe for you? That is entirely personal feel as to which shoe fits your foot. The type of shoe is important however. Court shoes are made to grip surfaces like floorboards, whilst also designed to allow the user to stop quickly and change directions, especially laterally. Running shoes are often designed with one direction in mind.. running forwards! Whilst running shoes can serve an initial purpose on court, if you are looking to play regularly then invest in some indoor court shoes.

If you keep them for the squash court, they will last longer (don't wear them whilst you take the dog to the park for instance). As a general rule I wear other footwear into the squash centre, change into my squash shoes, play/coach and then change out of them to leave. That way I'm also not bringing dust and sand onto the courts because I wore my squash shoes outside. Also don't make the mistake of giving them a wash and leaving them to dry in the sun (or exposed in the car!) Too much direct sunlight can in fact harden the gel sole making them very slippery to wear.

Another misconception is how long the shoes actually last you. I've heard guys say I've had these shoes for years, I'll get another year out of them for sure! Well you might still be wearing them a couple of years after you bought them and whilst the exterior of the shoe might still seem ok, chances are there are other parts of the shoe not so ok.

Recently I've been spending a lot more time on my feet coaching compared to playing, so the exterior of my squash shoes look in reasonable condition, however the sometimes 15-20 hours per week still impacts the cushioning and support available.

Whilst the younger lads might need to change their shoes because they have scuffed them up from throwing themselves around the court and dragging their feet a lot, I get to the stage that I feel a few of my joints pulling up a bit sorer as there is less impact being absorbed, meaning its time for a new pair. Maybe test it for yourself next time if you wear a pair of shoes still for sale somewhere, compare the height of the heel at the back and see how much lower yours is compared to a brand new pair.

As for racquets and advice, there are a couple of things to consider.

In the early stages I would recommend to beginners not to buy the lightest racquet available. Find something with enough weight in it that you can feel it when you swing. If the racquet is too light, players aren't 100% aware of where it is and can struggle to control it especially if trying to swing too fast. Really light racquets are great for flicking the ball around but can be hard to control when trying to swing a lot faster. Obviously head heavy racquets are the opposite to this.

If you have a racquet sport background then considerations for this as well. Tennis players often progress

to heavier racquets, so will probably find a heavier squash racquet easier to adjust to and gradually progress lighter. Whilst the nature of badminton and the play style will probably see badminton players going for a lighter squash racquet and potentially progress to a little bit heavier over time.

Strings are the final touch and can alter the performance of the racquet. Drop the tension down to increase power from the trampoline effect, whilst adding more tension increases the control. Consider your strings like the engine in a car, make a few tweaks here or there and see the performance change. Strings do degrade over time and even a freshly strung racquet will be a slightly different tension the day after it has been strung. Your car engine needs servicing on a regular basis, so do your

strings after a while.



Ultimately though play style will be the deciding factor. There are so many racquets to chose from that you will eventually settle on something that suits your play style the best, not just because your favourite PSA player uses it.

For the record, if anyone by chance wanted to copy my set up, I'm currently playing with the Dunlop Sonic Core Ultimate, strung with Dunlop Iconic Pro AF string at 25 lb + a 10% pre stretch!
