While July was slightly more subdued than June, there were still plenty of exciting events taking place, with goals being kicked left, right and centre.

Squash WA ran our first State Masters championships in many years. The event managed to attract 93 entries. More than half of the players were in the younger brackets between 35 and 50 years of age. 66 men played 124 matches, and 27 women played 43 matches - a total of 167 matches across Friday evening and Saturday. We wrapped things up with presentations followed by delicious food, a few drinks and loads of laughter and camaraderie; something the squash community in WA is renowned for.

I want to wish the players travelling to Amsterdam to compete in the World Masters Championships, the very best of luck. 62 Aussies are heading over which includes six West Aussies (Fiona Whooley, Prue O'Neill, Sue Hillier, Terry Brookes, Khris Wiaceck and Danny Zande) and one Geoff Davenport!

Then in the first two weeks of September, the Australian Masters Championships takes place in Canberra. WA is currently represented by five players in the individual's event and 19 in the teams.

David Ilich joined the team as the Centre Manager for our WA State Squash Centre. He's already started up a couple of extra weekly activities and has many more plans in store. We're very excited to have him on board!

I think you would all be feeling as proud as I am of Hannah Slyth and Daniel Marsh's efforts over in the US, representing Australia in the World Junior Championships. Out of 140 males, Daniel finished in position 53, and out of 101 females, Hannah finished in position 51. Then in the teams



event, out of the 26 nations that competed, Australia finished up 12th in the men's and 11th in the ladies.

After the Junior State Titles wrapped up on 2 July, the 2024 State Team, who will compete in the Australian Junior Championships at the end of September, was announced. For the first time, this year we are taking a division 2 team as well, which is a fantastic achievement and expansion of our Junior Development Pathway. Further to this, plans are currently underway for a 'Futures' squad, for those younger ones who are already showing serious potential, and are hungry for more.

THE CATCH UP - Here is the story from the Junior State Championships.
The results and presentation photos were published last month

The individual championship took place from 29th to 30th June at the Squash WA headquarters in Belmont, entries were at a 10 year high of 73 entries with 139 matches played.

Daniel Marsh delivered an exceptional performance in the U19 Boys division, demonstrating complete dominance throughout the tournament. He played three matches, winning all of them in straight games. Over these matches, Daniel contested 130 points, winning 99 of them for a remarkable 76% point win rate. His performance showcased an extraordinary level of skill and control.



Hannah Slyth claimed the U19 Girls title with a flawless display of squash. She also won all

three of her matches in straight games, mirroring Daniel's impressive feat. Coincidentally, Hannah contested the same number of points—130—and achieved the same 76% success rate, winning 99 points over her tournament. This remarkable coincidence highlights the exceptional talent of both our U19 champions.

In the U17 Boys division, Andreas Christou emerged victorious after a hard-fought final against Eric Marsh, winning 8-11, 11-7, 11-8, 11-7 in a match that lasted 33 minutes. Sydney Ennis took the U17 Girls title, dropping only one game throughout her tournament campaign.

Alex Marsh delivered a thrilling performance in the U15 Boys division, staging a dramatic comeback to defeat Jacob Curry in five games with scores of 9-11, 9-11, 11-7, 11-5, 11-3 and take the U15 title. Teagan Scott defeated her older sister Joey to take the U15 Girls title 16-14, 11-5, 10-12, 11-9 in 28 minutes.

Lucas Curry triumphed in the U13 Boys category with a decisive win over Mark Black, finishing 11-2, 11-4, 11-7 in just 12 minutes. In the U13 Girls division, Teagan Scott secured the U13 title with an impressive victory over Ella Clark, winning 11-5, 11-5, 11-4, also in 12 minutes.

We saw a glimpse into the future with Leonard Bruce dominating the U11 boys. Michaela Sanyangore emerged the U11 Girls Champion following a overall 3rd place result in the combined U11 and U13 Girls event.



The WA State Masters tournament was held at the State Centre in Belmont on the 19-20th July 2024.

This prestigious tournament has been running since 1982, a wonderful 43 years of history to date, with many notable winners. The tournament is unique in that players are age based rather than ability based, which means you may get to play anyone! This only occurs in Masters and Juniors on a yearly basis so is a special tournament.

2024 Tournament Summary:

We had 93 entries – 66 men / 27 women – playing 167 matches – 124 men's matches / 43 women's matches. Titles were awarded for 18 of the possible 20 age divisions.

First time winners -

- o Tim Cowell, Matt Sanders,
- o Roisin Brennan, Tracey Tapley, Lisa Christou & Fiona Whooley

Notable milestones

- o Danny Zande 15th title
- o Ray Villaroya 26th title, since 1995, so 26 out of 30 years!
- o Khris Wiacek 10th title
- o Sue Hiller 13th title, but 10th title in a row (2015-2024)
- o Tony Cottis 2nd title, 1st title was 19 years ago (2005)

Interesting stories

- O Jane Hunt & Sue Hiller's last match against each other was 44 years ago, aged 16. Long time to wait for a rematch!
- o Longest game was 28-26 between Ray Villaroya and Vic Thomas, as part of their five-set marathon. Combined points for the match was 150, just short of their combined age of 159!
- o Tony Cottis won his 2nd title, 19 years after his first title in 2005.

Fun facts on the history of tournament:

- o There have been 132 individual winners and 321 titles won in the Men's competition
- o There have been 88 individual winners and 251 titles won in the Women's competition
- o Ray Villaroya holds the record for the most titles (Men's and all time) with 26
- O Joyce Barnett holds the record for the most titles (Women's) with 17

Time Wasting

I had the occasion recently to warn a player for being late back on court. This was not just few seconds but a much longer period of time. After giving the standard warning "conduct warning - player late back on court" the player said, "come on Neil, this is not PSA".



So, are times important?

Times are important in most sports so that one team or one player does not gain an advantage over their opponents or opponent.

Players are entitled to take the maximum time allowed during any break in the game but must be ready to commence play at the end of the time period. For example, during the break between games the players are allowed 90 seconds.




After 75 seconds the referee calls 15 seconds at which point the players should go back on court and be ready to commence play at the call of 'Time'. 'Time' is not to be taken as call to go back on court. Examples of designated times are

- Between games 90 seconds.
- A maximum of 90 seconds is permitted to change damaged equipment



IM INTERVIEWS MICHELLE JONE

COACHES CORNER

with Tim Cowell



Michelle Jones is possibly more recently known for her photography work at the recent WA Open and State Masters events. Back in club land, she has been assisting with the Mirrabooka Junior Program now for a couple of years, even chipping in some help with the kids in Kalamunda!



Squash WA have recently announced a new coaching course in October, so if you are someone

like Michelle, not necessarily a top ranked player, but just super keen to help out, have a read of her short but fulfilling coaching journey so far.

What got you into playing squash in the first place?

I was never even remotely "sporty" as a kid and well into adulthood, so it never even occurred to me to pick up a racquet. Even though I used to hang around a squash court in South Africa where I grew up, trying to scab a Staminade while my parents played squash together, I was too busy running around, messing about in the saunas to think about running around on court. Racquet sports especially had zero appeal, as my natural ability is generously comparative to that of a goldfish climbing a tree! My husband Andy has been playing squash for 40+ years, and after we met, I was always the "squash widow", staying at home looking after the kids. It wasn't until we had one kid in the Cambridge Junior program, and then about 3 years ago introduced Eleanor, our youngest to the Mirrabooka Squids (4-7 program), that I thought about jumping on court myself. I had a little hit with Andy while waiting for the kids and I was instantly hooked! These days my natural flair for the game is still about the same, but I work diligently at it and I'm excited about my gradual, although sometimes painfully slow, improvement. I have a genuine love for the sport, which is something I never thought I'd say about any physical activity. I particularly enjoy the social aspect of the game, going to tournaments with my new-found squash "family", and my performance anxiety on court is lessening more and more as my ability and confidence steadily increases.

How long into your squash involvement did you decide to step into the coaching role?

It wasn't very long at all! If you've ever met Serena Richardson, you'll know how incredible she is at getting people to do things (Hi, Serena!). When Eleanor joined the juniors, I was quickly recruited to what was supposed to be one week in four coaching. That quickly turned into one in two, and now I coach every week at our junior program. I started off coaching on the "games" court, and since completing the level one coaching course, I've taken on some casual coaching roles at other

clubs and sessions which has been tremendously rewarding. My day to day work involves dealing with children and adults, so although I had a bit of imposter syndrome on the coaching side, I was confident in my ability to engage the kids and parents on a personal level.

You've completed the WSC Level 1 Coaching course, how much difference did doing the course make in your coaching involvement?

Honestly, in hindsight it was one of the best things I've ever done for myself! After the first day of the course I was in tears on the car ride home. Everyone else on the course seemed to have so much more ability than me! I was doubting myself and embarrassed that I ever thought I might coach anyone outside of Tic Tac Toe on the "games" court. On the second day, probably sensing that I was feeling out of my depth in a big way and on the verge of tears again, coach Tim Cowell said to me " You don't have to be a great player to be a great coach", Those are the words that I will remember and carry with me for the rest of my coaching career. It gave me the confidence to have faith in my own ability to connect with and guide children in a positive way. Now I'm more involved than ever with the juniors, having helped establish a "Girls Squad" at Mirrabooka, aiming to bring some of the younger girls up the curve by improving their hand-eye coordination and basic ball skills, and increasing their engagement with squash to hopefully carry it through their lives.

What have you learned about your own coaching since doing the course and getting back out into the community?

For my entire adult life I've wanted to do something greater than myself, something meaningful. I think I've found that with my coaching. I'm hoping to make a small impact on some young people's lives by encouraging them and building their confidence in sport and beyond. The Girl's Squad is very dear to my heart and I am very thankful for the opportunity to make a positive difference to the kids' development and future participation in the sport that I love. I've had some amazing opportunities since completing the Level 1 coaching course. I've coached kids in another junior program, with a small number of children but varying WILDLY in ability within the group. I'm now more confident in my ability to think on the fly in terms of a lesson plan and to deliver ability-based engagement every week, no matter who shows up. I've also had the awesome experience of coaching a group of "at risk" refugee and migrant children from a cultural centre, many of whom had never even hit a ball before, but many of whom stayed behind after the session had ended to continue playing as they'd had so much fun.

What is your favourite part of coaching?

OMG, seriously, the LOOK on a child's face when they manage to perform a skill they hadn't previously been able to is THE BEST THING EVER. I almost get more excited than them haha. You can probably hear me cheering wildly down the centre every week! Seeing the prodigious progression in the short session I had with the young

people from the cultural centre was an amazing experience! The Girls' Group is progressing nicely too and we're all gaining more experience and skill week by week.

What advice do you have for anyone potentially looking to get involved in coaching squash?

Honestly, just go for it! You have nothing to lose and everything to gain. Even if you don't have a massive amount of skill within the sport, your passion will win out. The skills you will gain are incalculable, as is the gratification. You don't have to be an extrovert or bossy. I'm shy as hell, but once you find your coaching voice, the kids will be receptive to it, so long as you have the drive and a big, positive, encouraging smile.




Autumn State Premier League Grand Final
