

I attended the Squash Australia AGM over the weekend of 23-24 November, along with association President Ryan Callegari. Squash Australia hosted an event to formally bring in the LA28 Olympics Games, with Ian Chesterman, President of the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) addressing the group.

The Squash WA Annual Awards were held at the beginning of this month. Congratulation to all the winners; we clearly have such an amazing community. It's very difficult to select only one person for each award, but our panel of volunteers did a great job.

Pennant and League seasons are coming to an end over the next couple of weeks in the Perth metropolitan area. It is with pleasure (or displeasure for some) that we say goodbye to SportyHQ. From 1 January, all pennants, leagues, in-house comps and tournaments will be run off the new platform RevolutioniseSPORT (Revo). We need more Referees here in Western Australia – but in order for people to want to take on this important role, we need to tighten up how we respond to negative behaviour. Early next year we will be running a six-week campaign which will educate and assist all players, both metro and country, on how to manage players in breach of our <u>Code of Conduct</u>. Squash Australia is committed to helping all states and territories recruit and train more Referees, so if this is something you're interested in, please contact the office and we will point you in the right direction. New players to our game, mature experienced players, or someone that doesn't play any longer but wants to give back, **WE NEED YOU.** You will be provided with tons of support, and opportunities to practice your skills at tournaments around the country.

As the last Behind the Scenes for 2024, I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to everyone's efforts over the last 12 months. The list of achievements below could not be done without us all working together. We've had record tournament attendance, and this could not be done without our club volunteers.

- We held our first State Masters Titles in many years and attracted a huge 93 entries across all ages 35 through to 80+. Over 50% of players were in the younger age groups of 35 to 50.
- Our State Junior Championships had the largest number of entries for several years, with the State Centre packed with 70 juniors.
- We introduced a novice event to form part of all Squash WA-run tournaments to

cater for our younger, beginner players.

- Squash WA selected both a division 1 and a division 2 team for the first time to represent Western Australia in the Australian Junior Championships in Sydney at the end of September.
- We held the largest WA Open event in over 10 years in June, with over 200 entries including national and international players.
- For the first time in almost 30 years, Western Australia played host to the Australian National Championships in June.
- An evaluation initiative was introduced to measure the effectiveness of our school programs and how they convert to junior program participation.
- We received more than \$25,000 worth of private sponsorship towards our multiple tournaments, events and junior initiatives, again proving we have truly amazing people in our squash community.
- Squash WA took on the running of the State Squash Centre from 1 July 2024, which is a new adventure for us, and hopefully a relief for Belmont Saints Squash Club who can now concentrate on being a Club again – Thank you Belmont Saints, for your efforts in running the centre over the past few years.
- We have been the most successful State in the roll out of Revo, and also lead the country in the number of schools and school students we have engaged with.
 We acknowledge the time and effort that goes into these successes, so THANK YOU to all those who played a part.

Special thanks to Serena and Roxy in the office for helping to carry the load.

To our coaches Tim, Sue, Paul, Eric, Josh and others, who have given more time to our juniors than they are paid for – thank you.

To our school programs coach Caleb, who seems to be winning with the kids and teachers alike – it's been a pleasure having you work with us this year.

To our Club Committees and Court Operators, I don't think you know how pivotal you are to the squash community. It has been an absolute pleasure working with you throughout 2024; I'm looking forward to continuing this trajectory and seeing where we can take squash in WA in 2025.

Over the next few months, we will profile the very worthy winners of each of the 2024 Squash WA annual award winners, starting off with Club of the Year –

Blue Gum Squash Club!

Blue Gum Squash Club has grown from 90 members to 200 members over a 3 year period and maintained this number for the past 3 years.

The Club has grown their junior program to around 35 juniors each week and see 40+ attending on a regular basis. The program encompasses a 4-7 year olds court, a club development squad court, and six general coaching courts. Girls make up more than half of their juniors.

Their juniors are developing and being selected into state squads, having fun, spreading the word, and bringing their friends; all which is needed to grow the game.

The Club is committed to encouraging players to engage in Squash WA competitions, have the highest number of pennant teams in the Tuesday competition, and have done so for several seasons. They also have solid representation at Metro and Country tournaments at both a junior, senior and masters level.

Blue Gum have worked collaboratively with the Blue Gum Tennis Club and City of Melville to achieve great things this year including successful state and local government to revitalise their courts, furniture, carpets, kitchen, and more. All of this has enhanced the overall atmosphere of the centre and provides a better facility overall to members and all users.

Blue Gum were also successful in obtaining a program and equipment grant of \$75,000 over 3 years to promote women and girls in squash, grow participation, and provide opportunities to engage.

Club members are actively involved outside of the club with representation on the Squash WA board,





It's all about the feet!

Time and time again I get asked about foot faults. "Do I have to warn the player before making a call?" "Does it really matter? "What part of the foot has to be in the box?" "As the Marker what should I do?" "As the Referee what should I do?"



Let's start with the dimensions of the service box. The internal dimensions of the service box are 1.60m (5 ft 3 inches in the old language.)

After the Referee has answered an appeal by John and announced the decision, the marker must?

a. Repeat the Referee's decision b. Call the score c. Repeat the Referee's decision and call the score d. The Marker is not required to do anything

Then we have the definition of a Foot Fault

"A serve is good if: At the time the server strikes the ball, one foot is in contact with the floor inside the service box with no part touching any boundary of the box:"

Simply put this means that at the time of striking the ball the player must have one foot inside the service box and not touching the line defining the service box. This includes the side wall. It also means any part of the foot (Big toe, heel).

Any part of the foot not touching the floor can be above the service box line as long as it is not touching it.

The other foot can be on the line or outside the service box. With the size of the service box and the size of most players feet this should not be a problem.

Doesn't sound too difficult but apparently it is for some.

The Marker is required to call "Fault" if they clearly see the Server foot-faulting. If the Marker is unsure, then they do not call.

If the Marker does not make a call of Fault and the Referee is sure that the service was a Foot-Fault then the Referee must stop play and rule accordingly. If the Referee is unsure then they let play continue and wait for a possible appeal from the receiver.

The receiver may stop play and appeal against the foot-fault or continue play or appeal at the end of the rally if they lose the rally. The Referees decision should be either "The service was good" or "Play a Let".

Do I have to give a warning? **NO**

Does it Really matter? **YES**. The service is the same as any other shot in the game.

If a player hits the ball Out, do I give a warning "Do that again and I will call it out" **NO**

Sometimes it can be difficult to make the split second decision but don't let that be an excuse not to call.

As a player just don't step into the service box and hit the ball. Be aware of your obligations.

Don't blame the Marker or Referee as **YOU** are in control of where you place your feet!



COACHES CORNER

with Tim Cowell



I can't remember a year busier than 2024. Coaching commitments, running a centre, even our son Jensen started walking and climbing. Tried to fit a tournament and some matches in here and there but largely it was a year full of learning experiences and challenges to deal with. So to wind down the year a bit, here is my Christmas wishlist for 2025. Some of the items might be a tad blue sky thinking, but overall if we saw clubs and centres begin to implement these things then we would certainly see an improved standard across the board.

Training aids/resources I would love to see in each centre:

- **Ball Machines** A great training aid for solo practice, plenty of repetition practice, throw down some targets, or crank up the tempo for a fitness blast!
- Functional training / strength and conditioning equipment Having mini gyms available for players as small training bases.
- **TV's with Cameras for immediate player feedback** videoing is a very useful tool for players to see what is going on, Verbal feedback is one thing, seeing it in action is another.



A larger workforce:

This has featured in my column before, we are seeing more coaches become accredited, but still the number of coaches working as a primary or part time basis is still really low.



Academy Programs in each club:

A flow on from above, with more coaches working, we might see more academies and training programs established in club land. The benefits could be massive, increased club spirit, increased training opportunities before the travel kicks in to other centres.

Pre-school Programs:

Plenty of sports offer these for young kids as a way of developing hand eye coordination skills. Doing them on a squash court just familiarises them with the surroundings. Again it requires not just a large work force to deliver, but the right people to deliver these types of programs. Not everyone has to strive to become a HP focused coach, this is just as important of an area to invest in.

More people (especially juniors) playing tournaments:

Depth drives standards up. If we get more people in organised events, then the competitiveness alone will drive the standard of play, before coaches need to even get involved. This was one key take from Rod Martin's HP athlete presentation (well worth watching the replay on Squash Oz)

A third of the Junior State Team from Regional Towns:

Back in the day of delivering a higher % of my school programs in regional towns compared to metro, there was a stage where the junior state team was close to 50/50 metro/regional juniors. Country towns had thriving junior programs. Covid didn't help things with some of the key people shifting to the city, but it would be nice to see our regional clubs well



equipped with junior programs and a pathway for those players to represent WA without having to relocate to the city so soon.

A Return to the Top 3:

Our Junior State team dropped to fourth place for the past two years, as we look to rebuild and return to the top. The top 3 states however are really close together and it only takes a couple of wins to flip the positions around. Each year is different as players age up or exams have their impact as well. What will be key is continuing to provide development opportunities for our younger players to learn and have fun in.

Have a Merry Christmas everyone. A great time to escape the courts for a little bit (not too much, court time is important!!!) but once finals finish up it's a good time to do a bit of different fitness work and be ready to go in January. Next year's calendar looks absolutely packed!



Each player is given two matches each Sunday for only \$44 for the term which includes court hire! Minimum membership level is 'Lifestyle' for this competition.


