# Pilley & Cuskelly crash out of the World Champs in Round 1

Sadly, World #13 Cameron Pilley was eliminated by an unseeded Egyptian (W#40) and W#15 Ryan Cuskelly was eliminated by a qualifier (W#61) at the World Championships in Cairo.

The Queensland Sharks won their 13th consecutive teams title at the AJC. The Sharks recorded victories in the U15 and U19 team events whilst their U13 and U17 teams finished runner up.

The WA Wasps finished 2nd overall. Their U13 team was simply awesome winning their team event.

The Tasmanian Devils created history by winning an age group for the first time when their players won gold in the U17 event.

Zac Alexander and Kiwi Amanda Landers-Murphy won both the Queensland Open and Mackay Open in October.

All was looking good for Australia at the Men's World Championship being played in Cairo when Rex Hedrick got through qualifying and joined Cameron Pilley and Ryan Cuskelly in the main draw.

Hedrick beat Christophe Andre (FRA) in straight and then Piedro Schweertman (NED) in a 71 minute marathon to qualify

as one of the final 64 starters.

Hedrick then drew World #1 Mohamed ElShorbagy. The gutsy Aussie went down swinging 5-11, 10-12, 9-11 in 40 minutes. A result full of merit considering his 71 minute match up beforehand.

Unfortunately, for Pilley and Cuskelly it was a day they would rather forget with both crashing out to lower ranked opponents.

The PSA World Tour is extremely tough and being at your best week in week out isn't easy so lets hope Pilley and Cuskelly can regroup and forge ahead once more.

Sarah Fitz-Gerald and Marilyn Kennedy won **GOLD** at the World Masters Championships in Johannesburg, South Africa

Our former world #1, who won a then record five World Open titles, has now added a third World Masters trophy to her incredible collection.

It wasn't all plain sailing for the 47 year old from Melbourne who nearly didn't make it to Johannesburg.

"It was touch and go for a while," said Fitz-Gerald "I had a calf injury which almost stopped me entering, so I feel really humble that I made it here and still came through to win another title.

"There's always pressure when you're playing for a world title, and it's a bit of a reality check in the Masters, everyone slows down, reactions aren't as good, and they play drops and lobs!"

The Queensland Sharks Junior Team won their 13th consecutive overall team title at the Australian Junior Championships. Queensland won the U15 and U19 team championships and finished 2nd in the U13 and U17 Championships.

The WA Wasps team dominated the U13 Championship whilst the Tasmanian Devils created history by winning their very first age team title when they took out the U17 Championship.

Our top two men on the World Tour were bundled out in the first round of the rich M150 Delaware Investments US Open 2016 in Philadelphia, USA.

Pilley went down to [6] Marwan Elshorbagy (EGY) 4-11, 8-11, 11-4, 8-11 (60m) Cuskelly was eliminated by qualifier Paul Coll (NZL) 11-9, 7-11, 6-11, 4-11 (69m)

Our top two women had mixed fortunes at the US Open. Donna Urquhart got off to a great start winning in five but Rachael Grinham was bundled out in three.

- Urquhart def [15] Victoria Lust (ENG) 11-9, 7-11, 11-5,=6-11, 11-6 (56m) Grinham lost to [13] Sarah-Jane Perry (ENG) 7-11, 5-11, 8-11 (26m)
- The only Aussie to reach the second round at the US Open was Donna Urquhart. She put up a strong showing in the first two games but couldn't advance past the #7 seed. Urquhart lost to [7] Amanda Sobhy (USA) 7-11, 11-5, 5-11, 5-11 (37m)
- Squash Australia announced that Townsville will host the 2017 Australian Closed Championship from the 24th-26th March 2017.
- Donna Urquhart fell to Kiwi Joelle King in the 1st round of the W50 Carol Weymuller Open 2016 in New York. King won a close contest 13-11, 3-11, 12-10, 11-9.
- Zac Alexander won his 6th PSA event for 2016 when he took out the Queensland Open final. He defeated Josh Larkin for the 2nd time this year but it was a much improved performance from Larkin winning the 2nd game and pushing the match out to 4 games over 56 minutes.
- Squash Australia announced the return of the Australian Doubles
  Championships. The ADC will be run in Darwin from 19th 20th November,
  2017 straight after the Australian Open.
- Rex Hedrick qualified for the 2016 Wadi Degla PSA Men's World Championships Main Draw when he defeated Christophe Andre (FRA) 11-7, 11-6, 11-9 (40m) and Piedro Schweertman (NED) 11-8, 11-9, 7-11, 5-11, 11-6 (71m).
- Our Australian Men playing at the World Championships in Cairo were all eliminated in Round 1. Karim Ali Fathi (EGY) def [14] Cameron Pilley (AUS) 3-1: 13-11, 2-11, 13-11, 11-6 (65m), [Q] Jens Schoor (GER) def [13] Ryan Cuskelly (AUS) 3-1: 11-7, 12-10, 8-11, 11-9 (53m) and [1] Mohamed ElShorbagy (EGY) def [Q] Rex Hedrick (AUS) 3-0: 11-5, 12-10, 11-9 (40m)
- Zac Alexander continues to dominate the Australian Tour with another strong performance at the Mackay Open. Alexander won his 7th PSA title for the year and defended his Mackay Open title from 2015.

Lisa Camilleri was the most successful Aussie women at the Mackay Open finishing runner up to Kiwi Amanda Landers-Murphy.

### **SQUASH UNITED**

Steve is a very passionate squash supporter. Having been a professional squash player himself, Steve fully understands the PSA system and he has helped countless players achieve their dreams. Steve is a highly respected innovator and personality within Australian Squash circles.

### SQUASH • UNITED

If we want our junior players to go on and become Professional Squash Players then we need to help them in many ways.

Every Junior Squash Player by the time they reach 18 has had thousands of dollars and hours invested into them by: parents, coaches, court owners, sponsors, State Associations, National Associations and others.

But once they finish in juniors all the attention and support immediately disappears and the result is that many of these players actually stop playing and the majority of them never achieve any significant success as a Professional Squash Player.

We need to both retain players for the

good of the sport and provide an opportunity for the Junior Champions to go on and succeed at Pro level.

Becoming a Pro is very easy, you just fill out a form and hand over some money.

Getting started as a Pro is very challenging. The system works on ranking points. To be able to play in an event you need to be in the top 30 (on average) of people applying for that tournament. That means if your ranking is below all of these people you do not get in ... even if you can beat them!

So when you are starting out, you have no ranking points so you have to hope that a tournament does not fill up with "ranked" players so that you can get in to the draw ... and then you need to win matches.

When you are starting out it is highly unlikely that you will even cover your costs at these events. You need to fly to them, accommodate yourself and eat and it is unlikely your prize money will exceed your expenses. There are ways to save a few dollars but it is still not easy.

It is most likely that this will be your story for 4 years unless you succeed early. Its not very enticing is it?

So one of our Stated goals at Squash United is to win the World Junior Championships in 10 years, therefore, I have given a lot of thought to how this is going to happen and what type of players we are going to need.

Already we are seeing that the best countries in the World have their junior players competing professionally.

### **SQUASH UNITED**



At the World Junior Championships this year the girl who won is also currently ranked 4 in the World on the Women's Circuit!

So in 10 years time it is fair to say that the best Country in the World will probably have their junior players competing at a high level on the International Circuit.

So Australia has to do this and we need to start the process now.

Here are my two ideas to commence this process:

1. Both winners of the Australian Junior U19 Championships should be awarded the wild card for the Australian Open. This guarantees them points.

In fact (depending on the prizemoney on offer) it may give so many points that it could save them an entire year of playing events.

I have calculated it and by saving a year there is also a potential saving of up to \$5,000 - \$10,000.

Australian Squash has an excellent tour for players getting started and by getting these points it is almost certain that you will qualify for every event so the benefit multiplies.

I also believe that the winners should have their professional registration paid for one year.

2. The top 4 or maybe even the top 8 in U17 should be taught exactly how the PSA system works so that they can begin their career and gain a strong ranking.

This could be delivered via a workshop at events etc and with a bit of mentoring it will be understood.

The Australian circuit means that students can do this with minimal disruption to their schooling.

3/ (yes I know I said 2). The winner of the State/Territory junior Titles should be given a Wildcard to the State/Territory professional Titles.

(A player is only entitled to one wildcard per year so they cannot get one for a State title and an Australian Title)

It is my belief that Squash Australia (owner of the Australian Junior Championships and Australian Open) decides who gets the wildcard for their events.

The State and Territory Associations have the right to decide who gets the wildcards for their events.
