Great to see **Cameron Pilley** and **Ryan Cuskelly** got past the first round in the rich Qatar Squash Classic.

After a disappointing exit from the World Championships last month the pair have bounced back and lets hope they continue to perform well.

The Qatar Squash Classic represents the third leg of the **2016/17 PSA Road to Duba**i.

Only the top eight players on the **PSA Road to Dubai** Standings will qualify for June's Dubai World Series Finals.

The updated standings were announced after the Qatar Classic. Cuskelly is hanging in there on equal 6th with 3 other

players whilst Piltey is currently in 10th.

- Donna Urquhart won her opening match at the W50 Wadi Degla Open against Hong Kong's Liu Tsz-Ling in a tough 5 setter. Down 1-2 the Aussie fought back strongly to set up a 2nd round encounter with #3S Raneem El Welily.

- Donna Urquhart put up a strong showing against W#4 Raneem El Welily losing a tight opening game before claiming the second. El Welily dominated the 3rd but Urquhart refused to surrender without a fight. The 4th went down to the wire.

- Zac Alexander completed the "triple crown" winning the three Queensland PSA events held over 3 consecutive weekends in October/November: the Queensland Open @ Nerang, the Mackay Open and now the Cairns International. His opponent in the inaugural Cairns International final was former W#45 Steven Finitsis. Finitsis turned back the clock beating the #5S in 88 minutes, the #2S in 50 minutes and the #3S in 81 minutes to reach the final. Alexander def Finitsis 3-1: 11-6, 11-4, 9-11, 11-7 (60m)
- A major upset took place at the Brisbane Open (PSA Satellite) when Zac Alexander lost the Men's Open final to Josh Larkin. It was the first time Larkin had defeated Alexander.

Larkin def Alexander 3-1: 8-11, 11-5, 11-8, 11-5 (50m).

As expected the top two seeds reached the final of the Women's Open with former W#2 Jenny Duncalf from England beating former W#1 Rachael Grinham. Currently both players are ranked in the World Top 20.

Aussies Ryan Cuskelly and Cameron Pilley reached the second round of the rich Qatar Squash Classic.

Australia's #1 player Cameron Pilley advanced to the Quarter Finals of the M150 Qatar Squash Classic with a comfortable win against Mexico's Cesar Salazar whilst Ryan Cuskelly couldn't take a trick against #5S Marwan ElShorbagy.

- The Aussie Women's Team used the W25 Monte Carlo Classic in Monaco to warm up for the World Team Titles. Christine Nunn and Tamika Saxby had to qualify for the main draw but fell one round short.

- WSF's Howard Harding reports on the final Pool C match between Australia and the Netherlands.

It was in the last tie on the glass court that sixth seeds Australia reserved their place in the last eight courtesy of a 2/1 win over Netherlands. Milou van der Heijden gave the Dutch team an unexpected lead after surviving a close encounter with veteran Australian campaigner Rachael Grinham.

In the first team match they have ever played for opposing teams, Rachael's younger sister Natalie Grinham went on for Netherlands - but soon went down to the higher-ranked Aussie left-hander Donna Urquhart to make matters level.

Despite making her first senior appearance for Australia, and having a year-long injury break which almost took her out of the game, Tamika Saxby rose to the occasion by beating Dutch opponent Milja Dorenbos 11-2, 6-11, 11-1, 11-6 in the decider to seal her country's place in the guarter-final play-offs.

"Despite losing tonight, Rachael can give so much - it's good to have her in the team," said team manager Michelle Martin, the former world No.1. "It was good experience for Tamika to bring it home for us the way she did.

"We've achieved what we had to do - we've got nothing to lose against France. They'll have the crowd behind them and we'll be the underdogs. We'll just go out and enjoy it!"

Saxby shines as Aussies advance.





The **2016 Brisbane Open** boasted a quality field worthy of a higher PSA classification. The Men's Draw featured 3 of the 4 semi finalists from the Queensland Open.

The top 4 seeds fought out the semi finals with Zac Alexander and Josh Larkin qualifying for the final. The pair last met at the Queensland Open where Alexander prevailed 11-9, 6-11, 11-8, 11-7 in 56 minutes.

In their first three encounters Alexander was too strong winning on each occasion in straight. At the Q Open Larkin stretched the match to 4 games. It has taken 5 matches but Larkin has finally broken through and recorded his first victory over Alexander in four.

It has been almost a year since I founded **Squash United** and developed four major goals to achieve over the next 10 years.

One of these goals is to have squash centres or facilities managed by professional programs or systems to ensure that they are profitable.

Once we have centres that can be run profitably we achieve a number of things;

1/ It is less likely that the centre will be pulled down, converted to a gym or used for anything other than squash. Not many people destroy something that is producing money!!

2/ It will be easier to convince Councils and Government bodies to include squash in any plans for new or upgraded sports facilities.

3/ Squash Centre Management will become a genuine pathway for University graduates. It will probably fall under the heading of Sports Facility Management but a Professional Management System for a squash centre has the same fundamentals as a Professional Management System for any sporting facility.

4/ This is the big one. We will attract entrepreneurs and investors that see that squash will give them a return on their money. They will want centres built so that they can lease them or manage them.

So that all makes sense doesn't it? And yet when you speak to many court owners they will tell you that it cant be done, there is not enough money in it etc, etc.

I wonder what reaction Jim got from his friends and family when he said he was going to start a lawn mowing franchise!!

He charges people to do what most people are perfectly capable of doing and in fact many of them have a lawn-mower in their garden shed!!

So my focus this year has been on the system and the people required to make Professional Squash Management real. And it has been very easy!

24/7 gyms are all around us. There seems to be an absurd amount of them. They can't all be making money can they?

I don't know but I do know that the 24/7 concept is here to stay and it is a perfect partner for squash. So, along with others, I have been learning all about it and what is required to adapt it to squash.

I am certainly not the first to do this. Greg Middleton opened up DGen Squash two years ago with swipe card access and many regional centres have had pin codes, etc for years. But it has not been done on a large scale and this is about to change.

Now of course there is a lot more to Professionally Managed Centres than just 24/7 access. There needs to be modern programs that fit to peoples busy lives and these need to be delivered by qualified people. Once again there have been some centres doing this style of program all over Australia for many years but until now it has not been duplicated and commercialised and that is why investors have never been involved.

My role with Squash United is not to undertake all of these programs myself. I aim to be a catalyst and supporter of those doing great stuff for squash. There are two very strong examples in the Australian Squash Marketplace right now and more to come.

In WA, **Kane Fasolo** now has three squash centres in his management group. Whilst he does not promote them under one banner yet, they all use the same system and have the same qualities.

Squash Mechanics operates on a National level and has two centres in Sydney and one in Melbourne (and more under negotiation).

The Managing Director is Peter Aitken and he has a team of partners and people operating their centres. He has now taken this a step further with **The Squash Alliance** which gives members equal rights at all facilities.

There is another significant management group that will launch in 2017 so in a very short space of time this goal of Squash United has some real momentum.

I am not here to tell you the secrets of each of the entities above but I have told you two names so you can follow them up yourself!!

I am now absolutely certain that in only a few more years we will have Squash Centres and facilities operating under branded names.

And for all the obvious reasons we need to be looking at squash courts being built as part of multi-sport centres. These can

> be privately held or Government owned, both will need professional management.

So watch this space because I think the revolution in Squash Management has begun!!
