

648 players participated in the 2016 **REDtone KL Junior Open**.

The most popular event was the Boys U13 where 98 competitors lined up to compete for the title. Australia was represented by Oscar Curtis from WA who was a finalist in the same age group at the AJC. He was beaten in the 2nd Round but managed to finish 20th overall.

AJC U13 Champion Gregory Chan (WA) had to step up to a higher age group and finished a credible 7th from a field of 85 competitors. Chan was the only Aussie to reach a quarter final.

Only 1 Australian performed better than their initial seeding. Queensland's Nick Calvert was seeded 9/16 in the U19 Boys and finished 5th overall.

11 athletes represented Australia: 6 from WA, 3 from Queensland and 1 each from Tasmania and NSW.

National junior coaches Vicki Cardwell and Tim Cowell helped manage and coach the squad.

Squash is the best exercise to prolong life study reveals

Thank you to England Squash for allowing ASP to reprint this article.

Regularly playing racket sports almost halves the risk of dying by any cause study shows.

Scientists have narrowed down the sports and types of exercise that are linked to significantly lower odds of dying before those who do not do those activities.

Racket sports, swimming, aerobics and cycling seem to be the best for prolonging life, the research concluded. Meanwhile, those who partake in swimming, aerobics and racket sports such as squash, badminton and tennis, also have a lower risk of dying from cardiovascular diseases such as strokes.

The study, published in the British Journal of Sports Medicine, examined information on more than 80,000 adults across England and Scotland who took part in national health surveys between 1994 and 2008.

In each of the surveys participants, who had an average of 52, were quizzed about what type and how much physical activity they had done in the preceding months.

Only 44% were getting the recommended



amount of weekly exercise.

Researchers also tracked participants' survival for an average of nine years following completion of the survey - 8,790 of them died from all causes including 1,909 from cardiovascular diseases.

After taking into account influential factors, the authors of the paper identified which sport or exercise seemed to be the most beneficial.

Compared with the participants who said they had not done a given sport, they found

- 47% lower among those who played racket sports;
- 28% lower among swimmers;
- 27% lower among those who took part in aerobics classes; and
- 15% lower among cyclists.

A Little History

Squash was introduced to the Commonwealth Games "sports family" in 1998 at the KL Games. Australia had instant success and that success has continued.

In 1998 Australia won **GOLD** in Singles and Doubles with Michelle Martin the star of the show winning the very first Gold medal for squash at the Commonwealth Games. She then





teamed up with Craig Rowland to win her second gold medal in the Mixed Doubles.

Our most prolific medal winners have been former World Champions David Palmer (8 medals) and Rachael Grinham (7).

Natalie Grinham is the only player to have won 3 gold medals at the one Games (2006). Rachael Grinham is the only player to have won a complete set of medals at the one Games (2006).

On home soil in 2006 Australia enjoyed its best result with our athletes collecting 13 of the 24 medals on offer.

The Main Aussie Contenders

The top 6 players on the PSA World Tour on 1/1/17 will be the main contenders. However, providing David Palmer is fit and wants to play I dare say Australia will take a gamble as they have done in the past and select him.

The scary thing is our leading players are no longer spring chickens! If they make the Games,

Palmer and Rachael Grinham will be 41 in April 2018. Cameron Pilley and Lisa Camilleri will be 35.

Experimentation is already taking place with our Gold medal winning combinations from Glasgow broken up and given new partners for the 2016 World Doubles Championships.

The formidable pairing of David Palmer and Cameron Pilley was split up. Palmer teamed up with Zac Alexander and won a Silver medal after being seeded 4.

Cameron Pilley joined forces with old partner Ryan Cuskelly and they were installed as the #1 seeds. Unfortunately they lost their semi final to the eventual winners from Scotland - Alan Clyne & Greg Lobban, who were seeded #2.

Doubles specialists Rachael Grinham and David Palmer didn't get to team up for the mixed either. Grinham was paired up with Cameron Pilley whilst

Palmer partnered Donna Urquhart.

#1 seeds Grinham and Pilley finished 5th whilst Palmer and Urquhart (seeded #4) reached the semi finals but were no match for the eventual winners from New Zealand - Joelle King & Paul Coll seeded #3.

Grinham partnered Urquhart in the Women's Doubles and were seeded #2. They were too good for the #1 seeds from India - Joshna Chinappa



& Dipika Pallikal Karthik (2014 Commonwealth Games Gold Medalists) but found the #3 seeds from New Zealand - Joelle King & Amanda Landers-Murphy too good in the final.

So the World Doubles Championships on home soil in August 2016 didn't deliver the results Australia had hoped.

Achieving two silver medals and two bronze from 12 medals was pretty good but expectations were higher. It was still positive and suggests Australia will medal at the 2018 Games but only if Australia gets its combinations right.

Interestingly Zac Alexander partnered Rex Hedrick in the 2016 Malaysian Doubles Championships in Kuala Lumpur recently.

They won **GOLD** beating Malaysian duo Nafizwan Adnan and Ivan Yuen. Whilst they played well as a combination it might not be a strong enough pairing to compete at the Commonwealth Games. However, it was good doubles practice for both players. Alexander is definitely a bright star on the horizon for Australia's doubles chances.

In singles our best chances are Cameron Pilley and Ryan Cuskelly.

If Pilley can recapture the form he displayed during the 2016 World Series, where he finished runner up, a medal is

very much on the cards. Cuskelly continues to improve and on his day can cause havoc.

England's Nick Matthews is the long range favourite to win his 3rd singles Gold medal.

Whilst Australia has hope in the Men's Singles it is a different story in the Women's Singles.

Our leading player is Donna Urquhart and based on the PSA Top 20 players, who qualify to play in the Commonwealth Games, Urquhart is ranked 10th.

Lead up Doubles events to watch in 2017

August 1-5: The WSF World Doubles Championships will be held in England. November 19-20: The Australian Doubles Championship will be held in Darwin.

Venue Details

Squash will be played at the **Oxenford Studios** (Movie World).

Ticket Sales

Ticket sales are expected to go on sale in April 2017. Tickets will cost \$20 for the preliminary round matches, \$30 for the semi-final matches and \$40 for the medal deciding matches. Children will be half-price.

Squash United commenced almost a year ago and for most of 2016 we worked quietly in the shadows. We identified our core goals and tested their relevance over and over again with members of the Squash Community.

I have approached many people to join and assist us and have spent a great deal of time working with them so that 2017 can be the action year that we want.

The most public work we have done is to be vocal catalysts for change and we have shared many ideas that we expect to be copied and implemented.

For squash to grow it will require help and assistance from thousands of people, so I will be asking everyone to do their little bit in 2017. And it is as simple as this.

FUN FUN FUN!

I expect that all of us play squash because on some level we find it fun or exciting or fulfilling.

With so much competition for the "leisure dollar" I don't think we put enough emphasis on just how much fun it is to play squash.

It has been reported plenty of times in Forbes and others that it is fantastic for

fitness and it is clearly more enjoyable than standing on a treadmill ... and this is exactly what we should be marketing!!

Most successful clubs have at least one great in-house competition and these are usually fully controlled by the Centre Manager and therefore the best place for new players to start.

So to make sure that the customer has a great "experience" and the biggest chance at fun we need to be doing the following.

1/ Have some music playing at reception.

2/ Staff must wear a uniform and

2/ Staff must wear a uniform and preferably a name badge.

3/ Have someone on reception that can "talk" and make the first point of contact a positive one.

4/ Make sure the centre is clean!

So what can players do? Lots!

1/ Invite a new friend ... every month!2/ Post a pic on social media of you playing squash so people in your network are aware.

3/ Find out about the club junior program and either offer to help (even once a year is useful) or promote the junior program to friends or family that have kids.

4/ Tell your kids or friends school teacher about the squash courts

5/ If you can't do any of this then I may ask you to sponsor our Squash United Junior Initiative for \$10. You may just uncover the next World Champion!!

There is going to be some incredibly positive happenings in squash in 2017. I hope you take the opportunity to be part of it and share it with others.
